There is Purpose and Plan  
In a remarkable book called "Black Reconstruction" W. E. Burghardt du Bois says, "No American now believes in his religion. Its facts are mere symbolism; its revelations generalities; its ethics a matter of carefully balanced gain." This is one of those sweeping generalities that take in too much territory.  
It is a fact that religion has been subjected to a series of shocks that have pretty nearly wrecked its traditional structure. Galileo shocked it with his discovery that the earth is not the center of the universe with the sun and stars circling around it. Darwin shocked it with his "Descent of Man." Religious people have been taught that man was created perfect and by sin fell. Darwin proved that man never was up. He is not yet to the height which the continuing processes of evolution may make possible.  
The astronomers shocked it when they peered through their telescopes beyond the clouds and found neither the streets of gold nor the pearly gates we once supposed were there.  
So religious people, robbed of the mental images of old and with no clear images to take their place, are bewildered and groping. In this sense they have ceased to believe.  
But nothing has happened to the voice inside that speaks in silence, nor the sense of awe that is still under the stars, nor to the deep conviction that somehow there is a purpose and a plan that makes life significant and duty worthwhile. They even dared to affirm that this purpose and plan extends beyond the grave and no scientist can ever produce any proof that their faith is unfounded.

TO AUTHOR OF POEM "TREES"  
Everybody of course knows Joyce Kilmer's beautiful little poem, "Trees." Millions have read it. Millions have heard it sung. No other American poem of the twentieth century has been more popular than those twelve short lines:

I think that I shall never see  
A poem lovely as a tree;  
A tree whose hungry mouth is pressed  
Against the earth's sweet flowing breast;  
A tree that looks at God all day  
And lifts her leafy arms to pray;  
A tree that may in summer wear  
A nest of robins in her hair;  
Upon whose bosom snow has lain;  
Who intimately lives with rain.  
Poems were made by fools like me,  
But only God can make a tree.

The establishment of the "Joyce Kilmer Memorial Forest" in South-west North Carolina, is announced—3,840 acres of magnificent virgin forest, the entire watershed of Little Santee Creek (isn't that a musical name that Kilmer would have enjoyed?) in Graham county, N. C. Joyce Kilmer, born December 6, 1886, was only one of the world's choicest spirits brought to an untimely death by the World War. He was killed in action in the Wood of the Burned Bridge late in July 1918.—The Progressive Farmer.

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## Dairy Prices At Best Since 1929

Present Outlook Is For Higher Prices Throughout Fall And Winter, Report.

Prevailing milk and butterfat prices are at highest level since 1929, and the present outlook is for a continuation of high prices throughout the fall and winter, says a statement from the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture. Feed prices are advancing, and yet the advance in milk and butterfat is keeping pace with feed prices.  
Recent events among dairy farmers in Kentucky include the statewide Jersey field day at Perry B. Gaines' Riverside Farms at Carrollton; the first annual Blue Grass Jersey Cattle Club show at Forward Farm, Lexington; a dairy cattle show at Springfield; and the annual picnic of the Purchase Dairy Herd Improvement Association at the Joe L. Payne farm at Mayfield.

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
