Clark Fair Is Huge Success

School and Agricultural Fair Held At Winchester Closed Friday; Big Crowds Attended.

The Clark County School and Agricultural Fair, which was opened in Winchester Wednesday, October 7th, closed late Friday afternoon and was branded a huge success by its sponsors.

The fair, revived by the Clark Farm Bureau after a lapse of 10 years, drew capacity crowds at all programs. Directors estimated that more than 5,000 persons attended Thursday night.

Judging of livestock was completed Thursday afternoon. A husband-calling contest, dog show and 'prettiest blend' contest were scheduled. A feature of Thursday night's program was a floor show under the direction of Misses Caroline and Laura Holt, Lexington dancers.

A parade in which more than 2,500 children participated was staged Thursday morning, the march being led by the Winchester high school band and the city fire department. Following the parade, an athletic field meet for rural school children was held on the Winchester high athletic field with M. D. Clay, County high school principal, in charge.

WILL ROGERS' RANCH PURCHASED BY WIDOW

There was none of the glamor of the auction sale when they sold the Will Rogers ranch Saturday at Claremore, Okla.

The deal was consummated behind locked doors, where the widow, the only bidder, offered a reported price of \$15,000 for the Rogers birthplace ranch at Oologah, and a 20-acre tract near the Oklahoma Military Academy in Claremont.
