G-Men Capture 102 Moonshine Stills, Setting New Mark

Federal agents of the Alcohol Tax Unit during September broke by wide margins records for still seizures both in Kentucky and in the Kentucky-Tennessee district, reports completed Monday in the offices of Howard E. Taylor, district supervisor, and W. H. Kinnaird, Kentucky supervisor, show.

The all-time high record of seventy-two still seizures in one month,

chalked up by the Kentucky investigators during August, was rubbed out in favor of a record of 102 seizures during September. The Kentucky-Tennessee record of 156 seizures was beaten by the 211 seizures during September. There were 130 arrests in Kentucky and 278 in the district.

HARNESS THIEVES ACTIVE

One morning recently when it was time to start things moving for the day on the farm of Wash McCubbin, north of town, it was found that one team would be idle for a time, as two sets of heavy harness had been stolen the night previous.
