Saddler, of Harrodsburg, Ky., husband of Mrs. Ferhn Saddler, 408 Lucas avenue, Owensboro, was liberated from a Japanese prison September 16, 1945, and reported by the war department, in a communication to Mrs. Saddler Thursday, to be "able bodied and ambulatory." He was reported missing in action at the fall of Bataan in 1942, and on August 2, 1943, word was received that he was a prisoner of the Japanese on the Philippine islands. Mr. and Mrs. Saddler have one daughter, Mary Ferhn, who is six years old, having been two years old when her father left for U. S. Army service.
