

Question 7. I am handing you an additional letter which I shall thank you to identify and explain what it is.

Answer 7. This is a notation made by this defendant December 31, in which he stated that he was returning some merchandise to us for inspection. He also requested an additional thirty or sixty days on the past due account. I am handing this to the Notary and asking him to mark it Exhibit "F".

Question 8. I am handing you another paper which I shall thank you to identify. Will you kindly explain the transaction fully and then hand the paper to the Notary for an exhibit in this case.

Answer 8. This is a copy of the credit memorandum which was passed to cover the returned merchandise referred to in the debtor's communication of December 31. The first and fifth items represent the return of the two pairs of footwear, which were found to be defective and which were replaced by a shipment on January 28, 1922, of new merchandise. The other four items represented footwear which had been worn out and were not subject to any further adjustment. However, in our endeavor to please the customer we made allowances on three of these pairs of footwear. This credit memorandum was returned to us by the Defendant with the notation that the credit should have amounted to \$16.95, instead of the amount shown. In reality this credit covered a policy allowance on worn footwear whereas only two pairs of the footwear returned showed any defect. The charge on the itemized statement of January 28, 1922, covers the two pairs of Footwear which were shipped to the defendant to replace the two pairs of footwear found defective.

Question 9. I am handing you an additional letter from the defendant and shall thank you to identify it and then hand it to the Notary for an exhibit in this case.

Answer 9. This is the letter from Mr. Royalty of March 28, 1922, in which he informs us that he has returned the merchandise and demands a total credit of \$235.94. I am handing this credit to the Notary and asking him to mark it Exhibit "G" and the letter of March 28, 1922, Exhibit "H".
