

Question 4. I am handing you two papers which I shall thank you to identify and explain fully what they are. You may then hand them to the Notary Public to be marked as Exhibits in this case.

Answer 4. These two papers make up the original order secured from this debtor on March 15, 1921, and calling for shipment of the goods during the month of September 1921. This is the same merchandise which was shipped on September 16, 1921, and which appears as the charge of September 15, 1921, on the itemized statement.

Question 5. I am handing you three additional papers. Will you kindly identify these and explain fully what they are. You may then hand them to the Notary for Exhibits in this case.

Answer 5. These are three letters which we received from the Defendant, dated June 8, 1921, June 29, 1921 and August 31, 1921. The first letter asked for return of merchandise for credit on the account. The second letter states that unless merchandise can be returned for credit it will be necessary to cancel the fall order. The third letter is in response to our letter of July 7, and is written on our original letter. We offered to allow the defendant to cancel twenty-four pairs of footwear from his fall order. I am handing these papers to the Notary and asking him to mark them Exhibits "C" "D" and "E", respectively.

Question 6. Kindly state whether or not the amount of the order was reduced twenty-four pairs in accordance with the defendant's request.

Answer 6. Yes Sir. If you will refer to the order you will see that the first three items were changed from one dozen pairs to six pairs and the fourth item was cancelled. This made a deduction of six pairs each on the first four items which made up the deduction of a total of twenty-four pairs. The amount ordered is shown in the third column and the amount shipped in the second column.
