VINYARD

The funeral of William Vinyard, 66 years old, was held at the chapel of the Bruner and Sims Funeral Home on Sunday afternoon, conducted by Rev. T. Hassell Bowen, pastor of the Harrodsburg Christian church. Mr. Vinyard died unexpectedly at Burgin Friday morning. He was unmarried and had boarded at the home of Mr. and Mrs. H. L. Jackson. He was the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. John Vinyard, his father having died about two years ago. He is survived by a brother, John Vinyard, of Harrodsburg, and two sisters, Mrs. Lawrence Stopher and another sister who lives in Ohio.

N. J. Hawkins, 84 years old, died about three o'clock on the afternoon of Saturday, February 1, 1936, following a decline in health for several years, due in part to his advanced age.
