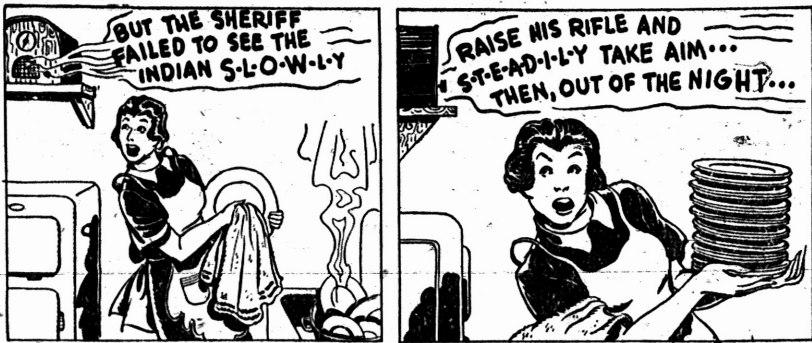

May 24, 1915

Homer Reed, a Negro, who was to have been taken to the penitentiary today, assaulted Jailer Albert Tatum last night as he attempted to lock the prisoner in his cell. Tatum was struck on the head with a piece of iron pipe and that he was not killed was due to his wife, who had accompanied him, who grappled with the Negro. Reed tore himself away and ran out the door and escaped in the darkness. A reward of \$50 has been posted for him by Sheriff John Morgan.

SMALL HOMES LEADING IN NEW BUILDING FIGURES

Construction of one and two-family dwellings led all residential building throughout the country in March, according to an analysis by the Federal Home Loan Bank Review of building permits reported to the Bureau of Labor Statistics.

Homes of this type accounted for 79.7 per cent in number of all projected building for the month, this study indicated. This is a higher proportion of individual family home construction than for any month since 1931. Dwellings for three or more families accounted for only 20 per cent of the month's building activity, compared with 35.7 per cent in February.

Not only was March the Nation's best home building month since 1931, but the increase in residential building activity over February was shared by every one of the twelve Federal Loan Bank districts except Chicago.

SOCIETY PRESENTS MEDAL TO COLLIE

Protection of horses drawing peddler's wagons was strongly urged by J. Macnab Wilson, managing director of the Humane Society, at the recent annual meeting of the association. During the past year, 4,273 horses were examined by the society, and 106 of the number were found unfit for work. Of the 10,334 dogs brought to the society's shelter during the year, 1167 were placed in good homes.

Sir Bob of Cluny, a collie dog owned by Mr. and Mrs. W. Diment of New York, was presented with a medal for two acts of bravery. In the fall of 1934 the dog saved a man from drowning when ice broke on the lake. In the spring of 1935 he pulled a stricken pedestrian from the car tracks, where he had fallen, to safety.

Everybody Has Some Vice

Everyone has some secret vice, and mine is buying newspapers. I take three in the morning and three at night, and if you ask how this leaves me time to do any work I will reveal my formula. I do not spend a great deal of time with the long articles at the top of the pages. These deal with the European situation, political speeches and evanescent scandals, to all of which I have developed a certain old-age immunity.

But I read with unflinching joy all the little items. Here one can observe the eternal pageant of human ingenuity, folly, frivolity, and unexpectedness. I note, for instance, that a scientist has grafted the hind legs of a salamander onto the front part of his body and put its front legs where its hind legs were before. Another professor has succeeded in causing a rooster to develop the characteristics of a hen, which he thinks is something to crow about; a third savant finds that he can compel tadpoles to become frogs much more rapidly than when they are left to their own inclinations.

Here, also, I make the acquaintance of a poet who is fined one cent for calling a county commissioner a sacred bull, the jury supplying the penny. At one fell swoop 17,000 Kentucky Colonels, myself included, are shorn of their gaudy titles; a judge who fined his wife two dollars for violating parking regulations wakes up to discover himself two dollars shy; and a poor citizen shoots himself because he is tired of trying to escape from an installment-purchase salesman.

The late Mr. Talleyrand said that when he should come to the end of life he wanted to die with a newspaper in his hand. I echo his wish.

Examples Are Best Sermons

Two acquaintances were talking about a man who used to be both rich and opinionated. One said: "Jim is nicer; it must be the depression. He didn't go busted, of course, but he got a good thorough cleaning. I think it has made him more human."

To which the other replied: "There's another factor. In the past five years his children have married and set up their own homes. Back in the years of his big prosperity they were beginning to assert themselves, and he was forever fighting and fuming, trying to run their lives, making himself miserable whenever he discovered he could not. Now, at last, he has surrendered. Somewhat to his astonishment, they have all turned out to be pretty successful."

A third man said: "That story hits the spot with me. I recently made the discovery that I was in danger of alienating my children because I wanted so much to have them just right. What woke me up was a remark by my nine year old daughter as we were riding to town. After we had travelled about a mile she looked up at me in surprise, and said, 'Well, Daddy, where's the sermon?'"

The temptation to try to lead our children's lives for them is almost inescapable. We are so conscious of the miseries brought on us by our own shortcomings, so anxious to save them from the same penalties. Yet most of our talk is useless. Example is about the only power that that really counts.

If the youngsters knew the quotation they probably would fling it at us often—Emerson's famous remark: "What you are thunders so loud I can't hear what you say."

Old Colonial Gift To U. S. Admiralty Court

A silver-plated oar, reproduction of one which the British crown gave to Vice-Admiralty Court of New York in 1737, today has on the bench of the tribunal which succeeded the pre-Revolutionary court to serve as its emblem.

The oar is about two feet long and is made of steel. On one side of its blade is the coat of arms of the British Empire and the motto, "Dieu et Mon Droit"; on the other side is an ancient crest and anchor.

Judge George Murray Hulbert, presiding over the Admiralty Court in New York, said he would have a special case made for it and that a deputy marshal would place it on his bench each session of the court for the remainder of this month.

It was recalled that the original silver oar was used here daily in the Vice-Admiralty Court until after the Revolution, when that court discontinued. The oar was then taken in charge by Marshall Ludlow, who passed it on to his heirs, and it finally landed in the collection of the New York Historical Society. Judge Addison Brown had a copy of it made in 1900, and it was this copy that was found in the safe of the clerk of the court when the tribunal moved recently from the old post office building in Park Row to the new federal structure in Foley Square.

Only two other cases are known where the oar is used in America as an Admiralty Court symbol. One is in Boston; the other in Bermuda.

'MERCY TANK' WITH 22 MEN 'SWIMS' FLORIDA LAKE

Donald Roebeling reports that his four-ton "Mercy Tank" swam a lake and plunged through thickets with an ease which convinced him it could carry on effective relief work in isolated storm areas.

The wealthy young sportsman disclosed that the 24-foot "Alligator" was put through private tests at the Roebeling estate near Clearwater, Fla., with 22 persons aboard.

Witnesses of the run said the strange vehicle traveled at good speed on land, then nosed down a four-foot ramp and crossed Lake Webb.

Mr. Roebeling explained that the "Alligator" was built for experimental purposes at the request of his father, John A. Roebeling. The elder man plans to keep one or two of the machines at his estate for possible rescue or relief work chiefly in the Lake Okeechobee area.

The tank is four feet high and eight feet wide, with a safety glass pilots' cabin at the front and room in the rear for 50 persons or a large quantity of supplies.

It is driven both on land and in the water with a caterpillar tread run by a heavy automobile engine.

WARRANTS ARE NEEDED TO ARREST

Constables have no authority to make arrests without warrants issued by courts of competent jurisdiction, according to an opinion given by Assistant Attorney General General A. E. Funk to Representative John M. Hunnicutt, Kenton county.

Funk's opinion stated that constables also have no authority to make arrests where any personal interest is involved and are subject to fine of \$10 for each offense.

KING EDWARD'S HORSE WILL RUN ENGLISH OAKS

Lord Derby's Tideway and Feola, from King Edward's royal stable, which finished one-two in the One Thousand Guineas Classic, were among the twenty-three entries listed today as probable starters for the Oaks, for 3-year-old fillies, to be run May 29.

The Oaks is run over the same distance as the Derby, one and a half miles and five yards.
