



FORMER SLAVE DIES

Matt Bottom, 82, a well known Negro, died at the county home Saturday, May 16, 1936, of heart trouble. Bottom was a slave in the family of Esquire Turner Bottom, and even though freed by the war continued to make his home with some member of the Bottom family. He made his home with the late W. H. Leonard for forty years. Four years ago after suffering a fracture of the hip and being unable to work, he became an inmate of the county home. He had been a member of the Mt. Freedom Baptist church for 61 years, and his funeral was conducted there Sunday afternoon with burial in the adjacent cemetery beside a sister and a brother, who died a number of years ago. One nephew, Andy Bottom, Doctor's Fork, survives.




