**A Play Place Is Proposed****For Both Young And Old**

The other night we sat in a meeting of earnest men. Those men had for discussion a play place in the outdoors for men. The conversation like the music went round and round. Finally, one man called on presented a thought, which in our opinion, is the instrument that will open the way for the realization of their object. The gentlemen took the position that since there has been developed much sentiment in favor of a play place for youth that the matter should be widened into a combination recreation place for both adults and youth.

The gentlemen were in a Chamber of Commerce meeting and launching a movement for a golf course here. The plan suggested appeared feasible for raising sufficient funds. But, in our opinion, the introduction of the idea of taking care of the youth will further the plans more than the committee may at first imagine. There are those who have no interest from any angle in golf who will join the golfers if doing so will get a well managed play place for our youth. Before this occasion the matter of a golf course has been up but the present plan is the only one seen as able of success.

A good angel or two could make a play place for youth an easy matter. It would be a far more beautiful monument than any they might erect for themselves of chiseled marble.

A golf course would require a caretaker and such a person would assure the youths' play place regular supervision and care of grounds and equipment.

Harrodsburg needs greatly, as we have pointed out repeatedly, both from an economical and moral standpoint, more effort in behalf of our boys. Should the movement start for financial pledges we are sure those interested in the welfare of our boys would willingly extend a helping hand.

To make the move a success those who play golf must strike or throw away their clubs. It is up to them to keep in front of the move now it is started.

It is conceded that a golf course would, through the summer, assure Harrodsburg with a crowd for week-ends and recreation periods.

It has come to the point where a good golf course is an essential institution in communities such as Harrodsburg. The Chamber of Commerce has done its duty by throwing the proposition in the lap of a committee composed of golfers. A week has now passed, so let's hear from the committee.

Such a play place would have three good points to its credit and no adverse features. It would be healthful, it would be wonderful for our young life and a thing much urged for their behalf, it would give Harrodsburg an added attraction.

**The Right Arm of "Malefactors of Wealth" Is Today The Liberty League**

Today Franklin Delano Roosevelt sees what years ago was dimly seen for the future by some and vividly clear by others, the trend of wealth to control American political life for selfish ends. Madison made a prediction, Lincoln made a prayer, while Wilson announced its presence and sinister influence. Roosevelt not only sees but feels the baneful influence of corporate wealth stalking through the capital. It is there to thwart all legislation calculated to better human conditions. The words of Theodore Roosevelt, when he inveighed against corporate wealth was: "Malefactors of wealth." Franklin Delano Roosevelt's denunciation is still ringing in our ears. James Madison, our fourth president, called the father of the Constitution, in his day was moved to say:

"We are free today substantially, but the day will come when our Republic will be an 'impossibility.' It will be an impossibility because wealth will be concentrated in the hands of the few."

Abraham Lincoln with his great heart was prompted to utter his feelings thus:

"I see in the near future a crisis approaching, that unnerves me and causes me to tremble for the safety of my country. As a result of the war, corporations have been enthroned and an era of corruption in high places will follow, and the money power of the country will endeavor to prolong its reign by working on the prejudices of the people until all wealth is aggregated in a few hands, and the Republic is destroyed. I feel at this moment, more anxiety for the safety of my country than ever before, even in the midst of war. God grant that my suspicions may prove groundless."

Woodrow Wilson the world's greatest historian and interpreter of his time in three terse paragraphs spoke his mind in this wise:

"The masters of the Government of the United States, are the combined capitalists and manufacturers of the United States."

"The government of the United States at present is a foster child of the special interests. It is not allowed to have a will of its own."

"The government, which was designed for the people, has gotten into the hands of bosses and their employers—the special interests. An invisible empire has been set up above the forms of democracy."

The Brookings Institution is responsible for the following interesting figures which explains much how unequal is wealth divided in America:

The 11,653 families with incomes of less than \$1,500 received a total of about \$10,000,000,000. At the other extreme, the 36,000 families having incomes in excess of \$75,000 possessed an aggregate income of \$9,800,000,000. Thus it appears that 1 per cent of the families at the top received practically as much as 42 per cent of the families at the bottom of the scale.

The Townsend plan with moderation would tend to correct this out of balance and produce a much happier condition of our citizens.
