FAYETTE PREDICTS LARGE WEED CROP

Belief that production of tobacco and most other farm products will be increased from 25 to 100 per cent in Fayette county during 1936 as result of invalidation of the AAA was expressed Wednesday at the first annual meeting of the Fayette county agricultural planning committee in the offices of County Agent J. Ed Parker, Jr., in the new federal building.

The tobacco acreage, it was estimated, probably will be increased to equal or exceed the large 1929 crop of 11,294 acres, more than regaining the base acreage used in computing the AAA allotments. Although the consensus of opinion at the meeting appeared to favor no increase in production over the 7,000-acre crop of 1935, in order to assure the continuance of satisfactory burley prices, practically all farmers present agreed that the acreage in their respective communities would be increased.

ROBERT WADLOW, 18, IS BIGGEST MAN IN WORLD

When Robert Wadlow, of Alton, Ill., was 9 he could lift his 150-lb. father. By last week Robert Wadlow, 18, had become the biggest man in the world, but he could not lift even his small brother. He stands 8 ft. 3 1/2 in., weighs 390 lbs., wears size 39 shoes (\$86 a pair). During the past year he gained 2 in. in height, continues to grow, may not reach his full growth until he is 21.

Robert Wadlow's gigantism is due to dysfunction of the small, chest-like pituitary gland, which lies under the front part of the brain. Among the many results which follow pituitary disorder is muscular weakness. Vast Robert Wadlow must move slowly and deliberately, lest he drop things or stumble. At Shurtleff College, where he is a freshman, he ranks well above the average. His best subject is German. When he graduates he expects to become a lawyer.

The Race Is Long Just because we have made so much progress and invented some useful gadgets, we like to think that human intelligence has made tremendous progress in the past few years. But has it?

Plato, born 2365 years ago, said: "A good state of affairs with reference to laws is divided under three heads. First, the laws must be good; second, the citizens must obey them; third, when having no laws governing certain conditions, men are good citizens if they act in deference to what is just and reasonable."

Chilo, another of the wise men of Greece, laid down these principles of conduct: "To make good use of one's leisure; to rule the tongue, especially at a banquet; to refrain from speaking ill of one's neighbors; to be more prompt to go to one's friends in adversity than in prosperity."

Measured by the wisdom of the Greeks, or the Egyptians, or the prophets of the Old Testament, we would be bold indeed to claim any evidence of intellectual progress. If this seems like a discouraging statement, then consider the other side of it. The best scientific guess puts the age of the earth at somewhere between three billion and five billion years. The beginnings of the human race, according to similar guesses, go back only about a hundred million years.

Of the hundred billion years which man has enjoyed, more than nine hundred thousand were used up before he had developed intelligence enough even to sharpen a stone and scratch a record of his existence. All real achievement has taken place in the last one hundred thousand years, most of it in the past ten thousand.

We speak of the race as old; it is actually absurdly young. Its course is not a sprint but a marathon, of which only the first few inches have been run.

Church as Comfort

The great task of civilization is the making of finer human beings. This is also the chief aim of this county whether we always realize it or not.

Most people, we believe, want to be "good," they want to do the right thing and, in the great majority of cases, can be counted upon to do so.

Women and Children First

Mighty Hector, the Trojan commander-in-chief, was slain in the war that brought the downfall of Troy. In the days of the Caesars the generals fought hand-to-hand; there was no sitting back in soft comfort, no waiting in marble halls for bulletins from the front.

While the Battle of Hastings was in progress a report went around that Duke William, the Norman invader, had been killed. His soldiers began to fall back in disorder and terror. But William, taking off his helmet so that all might recognize him, called upon his men to return to the fray. He didn't say, "Go back," it was "Come back."

Harold, the English king, was killed in that battle. Even as late as our Civil War some of the generals died on the battlefields, and others lost arms or legs. Stars upon shoulder-straps were no guarantee of safety.

We have come a long way from that. The declarers of war and the commanders of armies are no longer exposed to danger. Their headquarters must be bomb-proof. They are far removed from the scene of action. The next forward step toward logical warfare should be affected through an arrangement whereby majors, captains, and lieutenants may be kept out of danger zones. Also, non-commissioned officers and common soldiers should not take dangerous chances.

Let civilians, especially women and children, bear the brunt of battle. Drop bombs on them, and thus confound the enemy by cutting off his supplies of bandages, knitted socks, and other necessities.

When this procedure becomes general, mothers, wives and children, instead of suffering the horrors of war indirectly and for long periods, will have them over quickly and permanently. Events are moving in this direction. War is no longer a valorous business wherein men battle hand-to-hand. The valor and the glory are gone.

GENERAL REDUCTION ORDERED IN R. R. MILEAGE

The Interstate Commerce Commission, in a 5 to 4 decision, Friday ordered a nation-wide reduction of railroad passenger coach fares to two cents a mile with Pullman fare cut to three cents.

A majority of the divided commission asserted the move was necessary to meet the challenge of cheap highway transportation.

The order, effective June 2, brings the rates down from the existing 3.6 cents basic coach rate and the average of 4 cents for Pullmans, including surcharges. The surcharges were eliminated by the order. Southern and western roads already have established experimental passenger fares as low or lower than those fixed by the commission.

34,404 KENTUCKY YOUTHS WERE ENROLLED IN CCC

The Civilian Conservation Corps during its nearly three years of existence has furnished employment to 34,404 Kentucky youths.

Robert Fencher, director of emergency conservation work, made public this week figures showing that the government paid these Kentucky youths an aggregate of \$23,322,000 between April 5, 1933, and December 1, 1935.

DISPOSING OF UNWANTED DOGS

(Lexington Herald)

An appeal to owners of unwanted dogs to notify the Humane Society, which is ready to dispose of the animals free of charge, has been issued by Robert Meyer, president of the Fayette County Farm Bureau.

The practice of taking an unwanted dog or cat "for a ride" and dumping it out of the car in a strange neighborhood was criticized as comparable to giving the same treatment to an unwanted child.

The license fee on dogs, the Farm Bureau president points out, is merely a nominal charge which induces people to choose the dog or dogs they wish to keep, while other sections of the law provide for the humane elimination of unwanted dogs.

The danger from ownerless dogs roaming the streets and highways is too serious and the losses from the depredations of stray sheep-killing dogs are too large to permit of valid argument against the appeal of the Farm Bureau.

Every owner of an unwanted dog should co-operate promptly by delivering the animal to the Humane Society. Perhaps it will be given a good home; and if no home can be found for the dog, it will at least die a painless death.

KILLING MOSQUITOES' NEW WAY—USE TALCUM POWDER

In Paris M. Raoul Michel-May suggested to the French Academy of Sciences a new method of exterminating mosquitoes in open ponds. At present a favorite method is to spread a thin film of oil on the water. When the mosquito larvae, which breathe through tubes in their tails, thrusting their tails out of the water to get air, oil clogs the tubes and the larvae suffocate. M. May recommended sprinkling the water with talcum powder impregnated with a compound of chlorine and then which would choke the larvae to death but would not harm human beings.
