SEVERAL FIRES RESULT IN LOSS

Shirley Cottage; Buster Barn, Servants House Totally Destroyed; Motorcycle Fire.

Fire took its toll of property in the county during the past week and several smaller fires in the city threatened to cause heavy damage but the latter were extinguished before serious damage resulted.

The one-story home of Blake Shirley, Bellows Mill Pike, was burned to the ground early Friday night while the Shirleys were at the high school gymnasium during the district basketball tournament. Shirley is employed by the Harrodsburg high school as general caretaker.

A neighbor, Mr. Arnold, first noticed the fire and rushed to town to get the fire department. The residence being out of the city, water was not available but Fire Chief K. B. Phillips and Patrolman E. L. Lester went to the scene and, at the cost of scorched faces and hands,

saved the outbuildings. None of the household furniture was saved. Shirley also rushed to the burning building but was unable to save any of his property. He told Chief Phillips that he had a total of \$1,200 insurance, equally divided between house and furniture. Shirley estimated the house loss at \$1,150. He probably will rebuild, he said.

The home, though small, had the reputation of being a showplace of the county because of the neat, well-kept appearance of both house and yard, and had received newspaper comment and praise.

Sunday morning at 9:20 the large stock barn and two-room servant cottage on the farm of John S. Buster, Buster Pike, burned to the ground at an estimated loss of \$2,500. Mr. Buster and his son, Jim, had just returned from Danville when a servant told them the barn roof was on fire. The barn housed several head of stock, all of which were saved with the exception of one calf which met its death in the flames. The barn also contained a quantity of feed and farming implements.

The barn was covered by \$1,500 insurance but no insurance was

carried on the cottage. Origin of the fire was not known, the flames starting in the upper part of the barn.

Sunday night at 8:25 Mr. Charlie Davis, Price avenue, turned in the alarm when a motorcycle belonging to his son-in-law, Chell Coleman, Jr., Burgin, caught fire in the Davis yard. Coleman rolled it out on the street after he failed to smother the flames with a rug. The firemen extinguished the flames with chemicals but considerable damage was done to the vehicle. The machine caught fire when Coleman started the motor. Coleman was not burned.

Ky. Assembly To Dig Up \$15,000,000 Taxes

Governor Needs That Much This Fiscal Year To Carry Out State Budget Program

New tax requirements for the fiscal year's operation of the State Government will be between \$12,000,000 and \$15,000,000, Gov. A. B. Chandler told the joint meeting of the General Assembly in Frankfort Monday opening the special session for budget study.

The new budgets needs will be \$3,085,000 less than the amount appropriated for the last fiscal year, the Governor said, with the bulk of the savings to be devoted to payment of old age pensions.

Governor Chandler's estimate of tax needs was the first he has given in the General Assembly, which started Monday on consideration of fiscal matters. The Governor said he believed the budget session should be concluded in two weeks.
