Dear Capt:-

I want to our V.F.W. Bataan memorial post 6935 today  
as they were having the 10<sup>th</sup> District. V.F.W. meeting there today.

Our commander of V.F.W. Cohen Teter gave me your  
letter you had wrote to him. So I thought I would answer it, as I  
was one of the men who were in the 38<sup>th</sup> Tank Company, Ky. national  
guard, as I joined them in 1933, and we were called to Fort  
Knox, Ky. back in 1940 and we were taken out of the 38<sup>th</sup> tank  
co. and was put in the 192<sup>nd</sup> Tank Battalion. Company D, co.  
which the 192<sup>nd</sup> was made up from one tank company from (4)  
different division which Harrodsburg, Ky was in the 38<sup>th</sup>, another  
Company was taken out of a Division from Jamestown, Wis,  
another Company was taken out of a Division from Maywood, Ill, and  
the other Company C was taken out of a Division from post Clinton, Ohio,

It was bba of us from Harrodsburg, Ky, and after we were put in the  
192<sup>nd</sup> Tank Battalion. They made a Headquarters Company and they  
taken some men out of each company and made the Headquarters  
Company. Then each company was filled back with full strength  
with men who was drafted in the Army or volunteered from each state and  
put in the Company from the state they were from. until we reached  
the Philippines and they taken our Company D out of the 192<sup>nd</sup> TK. BN.  
and put it over in the 194<sup>th</sup> TK. BN. which was made up from 3 other  
division. and to form a line across Bataan. The 194<sup>th</sup> TK.BN  
didn't have any Company D. But I all ways said I was in Co. D.  
192<sup>nd</sup> TK.BN. as we were fighting and never did see many of the  
men from 194<sup>th</sup>. We went to Fort Knox, Ky, I think it was Nov, 25. 1940,  
the ship our 192<sup>nd</sup> Tank Battalion was on arrived in Manila, Philippines  
just 18 days before the Japanese bombed us at Fort. Stotsenburg, P.I.  
a Army post joined Clark Field, P.I. That was the 1<sup>st</sup> day we had

The man names Robert Brooks was killed by some pieces of one of the Japanese bombs came from one of the 53 or 54 Japanese planes come over at dinner time as most of the boys were waiting for the mess truck to bring our food out to Clark field or we had our Army tanks backed off the air field run way. Robert Brooks was from Soderville, Ky., and was drafted or volunteered and was put in our Company D, 192<sup>nd</sup> TK BN. We were in the Mess Hall eating our breakfast heard on the Radio about ~~Japanese~~ hitting Pearl Harbor. Back in April 1974, I decided to write the General of Fort Knox, Ky., and ask him about the dedication of naming the parade ground at Fort Knox, Brooks field.

So the General turned my letter over to the Historian at Fort Knox, Ky. He then mailed me all the Special orders, and letters about the Brooks Field. I told the General that Robert Brooks was in my company D, 192<sup>th</sup> TK BN, I will give you the numbers and letters on each page. <sup>that letter was dated April 5, 1974</sup> ATZ K-pa-Ag-AR, one one page, on one page General orders number 43, dated Dec. 22, 1941, Extract from Armored Force news, Fort Knox, Ky., Dec. 24, 1941, Private Honored in impressive knot ~~ceremony~~ ceremonies, another page on on it Headquarters Armored Force, Public Relations Bureau. For Brooks Immediate Release. Fort Knox, Ky., Jan. 13, The reason I wrote all the above down, thought you may want to look it up and get a copy of it, about (Robert Brooks).

Our Commander of the 192<sup>nd</sup> at Fort ~~Knox~~, Ky., was Bacon, R. Moore, from Harrodsburg, Ky. But when the Commanders was over in La., and before we left there, they didn't take Colonel Bacon, R. Moore, (I guess because of his age) and they put Major Wickard from Maywood, Ill., in Col Bacon, R. Moore place. Bacon, R. Moore is now deceased, since we returned I heard that Major Wickard had died up at Maywood, Ill.

We had 66 boys from Harrodsburg, Ky. went to Fort Knox, Ky. And we had 29 of them to die in p.o.w. camps in the Philippines and P.O.W. camps in Japan or went down on Japanese ships leaving the Philippines. And 37 of us returned back to Harrodsburg, Ky and never country. And since we came back we have had 12 to die, so Out the 66 we had it is 41 dead and 25 of us living. But not many around Harrodsburg, as they have moved all over U.S. And we have a few real sick.

You mention William Gentry, he was put over in Company C, 192<sup>nd</sup> I think el will give you his address. William Gentry, 6116 Oakview Drive Lakeland, Fla, 33803, el will give you another officer from Harrodsburg who was put over in the HQ Headquarters over both 192<sup>nd</sup> TK-BN and 194<sup>th</sup> TK-BN. after we gotten in the Philippines. He ~~was~~ was discharged as a Major el think. His name is Edwin W. Rue, 850 Tremont Ave. Lexington, Ky, 40502.

We had a man who was discharged from army after 20 years as a Master Sgt. He has been a instructor in the Armored Tank School at Fort Knox after he was discharged. He had a Brother to die over in Bataan. He is a Harrodsburg boy. But name is Morgan French, Route 2, Pinewood Drive, Radcliff Ky, 40160.

Edwin W. Rue had a brother to die over there in Japan el think he was Lt. Arch. B. Rue.

El was a P.O.W. for 3 years and 5 months, el ~~weighted~~ weighed 200 when the war started started and when the war II was over el had lost 95 lbs. Went down to 105 pounds, el was a P.O.W. for 1 year and 5 months in the Philippines, the Japs taken me to Japan in Sept 1943 and was at Nagato, Japan for 2 years, el lost the use of one eye, and fell off of a coal trussel where the ships come in loaded with coal and el fell 35 feet landed on my feet and made a vertebral in my back cause fath my feet to drop. So el have to wear braces, fath shoes to hold my feet up. So el have lost the use of both feet.

El got Col. George Chinn to help me get a Army tank for a road side Park on North 122 Highway as soon into Harrodsburg, K. We wrote Washington

H.C. and at First they wanted to give me a army tank at Texacoma Ark. But el told them, el didn't have no way getting it to Harrodsburg, Then the General at Fort Knox, Ky. Called us and told to come to Fort Knox and get a Army ~~an~~ tank, el told the General el didn't have any money to get it to Harrodsburg. So he said he would let his men at Fort Knox, bring it up here on a low boy, So they did. Then el had a flag pole made, and get the plaque donated. And get the state to cut the Bank down to set the Tank.

el have one ore two things el have a extra copy so el will <sup>send</sup> you one of them. When Bataan fell, el made it over the Corregidor, stayed there for one day and one night, and they ask for a detail to help out on Fort Drum which was a Concrete battleship made on a high rock out in the manila bay, el helped fight and helped fire a 14 inch gun off of Fort Drum it went about ~~20~~ miles or farther and we killed a lot of Japs when we fired the 14 inch gun. over in Bataan. So el wasnt on the death march, el was in the p.o.w. camp Capanatuan 1 and 3, Bilibid. Worked on building a runway at Nichols field, then on to Niigata Japan. el havent been able to work since el was discharged from the Army Feb. 5, 1947.

el was a staff Sgt all the time but when el come out of ~~of P.O.W.~~ the Army they raise up ~~one~~ one rank. So el was discharged as Tech Sgt. Maurice E. (Jack) Wilson used to be in Company D, 192 Tank Battalion P.O.W. 3 years and 25 months.
