### ROYALTY

J. T. Royalty, 58 years old, an engineer for the Works Progress Administration at the county rock quarry, died at 5:45 o'clock Friday morning, August 21, 1936, as a result of heat prostration suffered the previous Tuesday noon while working at the quarry. Mr. Royalty's death is the first recorded in Mercer county during the present heat wave.

### S. A. CARROLL PICTURED IN MASONIC JOURNAL

He is a member of Daviess Chapter No. 29, R. A. M., having been exalted to the august degree of Royal Arch Mason, July 22, 1920. He served as high priest in 1921-22. He is a member of Danville Council No. 48, R. & S. M., having taken the degrees August 9, 1928. He was elected thrice illustrious master September 28, 1923.

He is a member of Ryan Commandery No. 17, K. T., having received the Knight Templar degrees in that commandery May 18, 1925. He was elected eminent commander March 27, 1934. He is also a member of the Order of High Priesthood.
