**THE ANGEL OF THE BATTLEFIELD**  
**CLARA BARTON**

Clara Barton came from a family of school teachers. When she was eleven years old, her brother fell from the roof of a barn. Clara nursed him for the next two years, and was undoubtedly influenced at this time toward a career of nursing.

With the outbreak of the Civil War, Clara Barton volunteered her services. All through the war she endured the privations and dangers of working behind the firing lines. With the war over, she carried on her most difficult labor, searching for missing men, and identified more than 12,000 graves.

A trip to Europe during the Franco-Prussian War brought Clara face to face with the International Red Cross, and in 1879, inspired her to organize the Red Cross of America. She acted as its chief until 1904, doing noble relief work, not only in war times, but in times of national disasters, such as floods and earthquakes. It can truly be said of her that she helped relieve the world's sufferings.



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**CAR TRAYS FOR PICNICKERS**

**Admission to West Point**

It is not required that an applicant for admission to West Point be a high school graduate. But the entrance examination is such that unless he has had a first class high school education or its equivalent, he will not be able to make an entering grade. The course of study is four years, during which the cadets are under strict military discipline. Summers are spent in camp. Upon graduation cadets are commissioned second lieutenants in the United States Army, and are assigned wherever they may be needed. Upon entrance to the academy a student binds himself to the government for eight years.

**Rivers Older Than Mountains**

**Telling Hours by Bells**

**Common Practice on Ships**

On shipboard, for purpose of discipline, and to divide the watch fairly, the crew is mustered in two divisions, the starboard (right side, looking toward the head) and the port (left).

The day commences at noon and is thus divided: Afternoon watch, noon to 4 p. m.; first dog watch, 4 p. m. to 6 p. m.; second dog watch, 6 p. m. to 8 p. m.; first watch, 8 p. m. to midnight; middle watch, 12 p. m. to 4 a. m.; morning watch, 4 a. m. to 8 a. m.; forenoon watch, 8 a. m. to noon.

This makes seven watches, which enables the crew to keep them alternately, as the watch which comes on duty at noon one day has the afternoon the next day, and the men who have only four hours' rest one night have eight the next. This is the reason for having the dog watches, which are made by dividing the hours between 4 p. m. and 8 p. m. into two watches, notes a writer in the Cleveland Plain Dealer.

Time is kept by "bells," rung every half hour and beginning with each watch (except that one series of "bells" runs through the two dog watches).

**Ancient Beds of Great**

**Luxury, History Reveals**

Ancient and medieval writings describe beds of great luxury, of silver and gold they appear in the Bible. As part of the furnishing of an Athenian villa one is described of maple veneer with an ornamented board at the top to support the head and girths stretched across to support the mattress. After the introduction of Asiatic luxury into Rome, according to a writer in the New York Sun, wealthy citizens furnished their sleeping apartments with large couches of rare Indian woods and ivory and sometimes inlays of gold, amber or tortoise shell. Throughout the Middle Ages beds were furnished with sets of priceless tapestries or splendid embroideries mounted upon four-post frame work which they entirely concealed in a wealth of curtained and canopied inclosure.

In the sixteenth century beds retained their four-post and canopied forms and their rich hangings but the frame acquired importance on its own account. The stately curtains were made to be drawn, revealing handsome carved wood panels and posts sometimes gilded and painted and often inlaid. Gradually the hangings, however, became subservient to elaborate carvings and other enrichments such as gilding, painting and marquetry.

**Dome of the Invalides**

The great dome of the Invalides church, beneath which Napoleon's tomb lies, was built by Mansart at the beginning of the seventeenth century on Grecian lines and consists of two cupolas. The first of these, in twelve painted compartments, opens immediately above the tomb, says the Baltimore Sun. The remains of Napoleon were placed in the beautiful tomb in 1840 with great ceremony. Looking down upon it from the marble rail above, it is seen suffused in a soft sunset glow, obtained by the finely tinted windows, yellow at the sides and bluish above. The great sarcophagus is cut from a single block of magnificent Finland granite, of a rich red, presented by the Czar Nicholas. This slab rests upon a base of green Vosges granite. The sarcophagus is the work of Visconti.

**Patented Seven-Shot Carbine**

The seven-shot carbine introduced into the United States Army was patented in 1860 by Christopher M. Spencer and was made by the Spencer Repeating Arms Co., Boston, Mass. It was extensively used during the Civil war. A caliber .56, rimfire, seven-shot rifle which loaded through a trap in the butt plate. The loading was very slow until the appearance of the Blakeslee's patent cartridge box containing 10 tin tubes each holding seven cartridges, each tube loadable as a unit. This method was in use during the last two years of the war.

**Patrick Henry Immortal**

Patrick Henry was born May 29, 1736. He served five terms as governor of Virginia and in later life was offered the positions of secretary of the treasury and chief justice, but declined them both. He died in 1799. He is immortal in American history for his stirring words: "I know not what course others may take, but as for me, give me liberty or give me death."

**REPRODUCTION OF MAMMOTH CAVE TO BE SEEN AT FAIR**

Kentucky will advertise its principal tourist attraction to the world when a huge reproduction of the historic entrance of Mammoth Cave will be set up in the Merchants & Manufacturers Building at the Kentucky State Fair. At the mouth of this "Cave" will be a registration booth for visitors.

As a means of stimulating interest in the great cavern at Kentucky's National Park, a free all-expense tour of Mammoth Cave will be given each day to one of the registrants at the State Fair booth. This will include a night's lodging at the Mammoth Cave Hotel, four meals, and the all-day de luxe trip through the cave, a feature of which is the mid-day meal served in Snowball Dining Room, 260 feet underground.

Eyeless fish, eyeless crawfish, and other unique Mammoth Cave material also will be on exhibit at the State Fair.

**The Spitz Dog**

The Spitz dog, named for the Arctic islands of Spitzbergen, is a descendant of the part-wolf ancestors of chows and samoyeds. Like them it pulled sleds in the frozen north. The breed later became popular in Europe. Various shepherd breeds, and the chipperke and the pomeranian, were developed from it.

**Mediterranean Tides**

The tides of the Mediterranean are very slight—in most places only a few inches. The sea tides do enter at the Straits of Gibraltar, but their influence does not extend far. The straits, at the narrowest point, are eight miles wide. Between Gibraltar and Ceuta the distance is thirteen miles.

**Jail for Lying Swains**

Rumania punishes the lover who "swanks" in a penal code. Anyone who seeks to win the love of a girl by pretending to be richer than he really is or falsely claiming a title is liable to three months' imprisonment under the code, even if he really intends to marry the girl.

**Magoffin County Goes Bone Dry**

Voters Of Salyersville and Locality Vote in Favor of Local Option; Beer Is Taboo.

Magoffin county today was theoretically bone dry. The lid was legally screwed on Saturday at midnight and enforcement plans are being made this week.

Voters of the county decided June 1 in favor of the local prohibition of liquor. It was the first option law of the state.

Beverages with more than 1 percent of alcohol are prohibited. Sever-

al beer dealers renewed their licenses in July but will be given a refund.
