SECRET OF DRESDEN CHINA DISCOVERED BY ALCHEMIST

Meissen, Germany owes its great porcelain works, the home of Dresden china, to a young man, Johann Bottger, who started out early in the eighteenth century to convert base metals to gold and discovered instead the secret of making porcelain.

Imprisoned by August the Strong, king of Saxony, and told to produce gold by alchemy, Bottger went out over the countryside digging mysterious holes in the ground and keeping samples of the earth he dug up. Then after experiments with these he succeeded in making a red earthenware and later a white porcelain, wares that had hitherto been obtainable only in China.

Today travelers are allowed to go through the porcelain works in Meissen and view at leisure the various processes, but in Bottger's time the secret was so valuable that August the Strong kept him and his workmen virtually prisoners. A century after the discovery for instance, when Napoleon wanted to know the process, the director of the works had to ask the Saxon Elector before he could reveal it.

One of the finest collections of Dresden china is, appropriately enough, in Dresden, only seventeen miles from Meissen. It contains an example of nearly every piece ever turned out by the factory, and in addition has thousands of specimens of the finest Chinese, Japanese and European porcelains.

HORN HONKERS

The driver who honks his horn unnecessarily isn't exactly a menace, but he is one of the greatest nuisances our civilization has developed. Exterminating him would probably be too severe punishment but if it is possible to civilize him, no effort should be spared to do so.

The horn on an auto should be for emergency use only and the fellow who uses it indiscriminately is abusing the purpose for which it is intended as well as making himself a sort of public enemy.

Many of the larger cities are campaigning against unnecessary noises and the excessive use of auto horns is getting due attention. In New York and other large centers, several arrests and fines have been meted out to those who disturb the peace with auto horns.

It has been estimated that the average driver uses the horn about five times as much as it should be used legitimately. The fine suggestion made on the subject that the use of brakelights should replace the use of the horn has real merit and such practice would automatically eliminate the horn honker and the nuisance that he creates.
