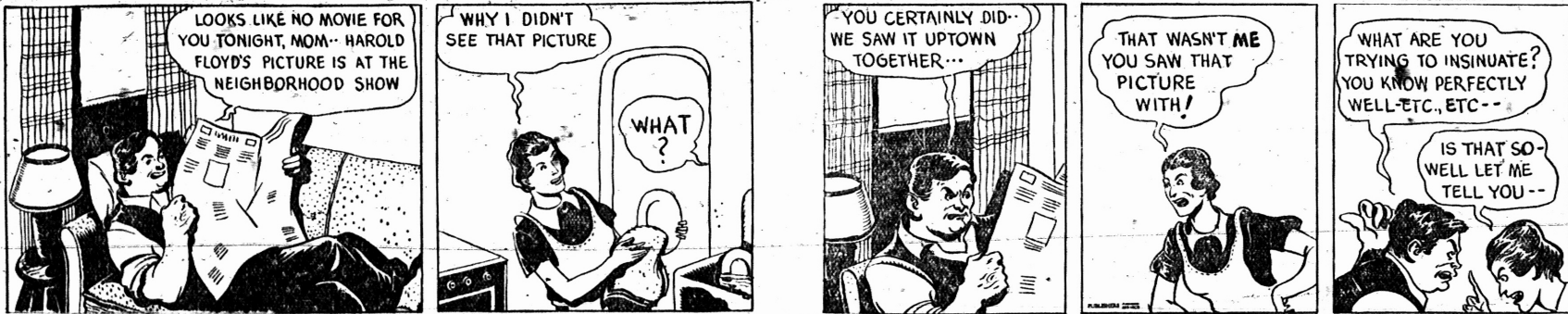

April 23, 1915
Dr. C. P. Curry, of the State Sanitary Board, was brought here Tuesday by the members of the water committee made up jointly of city officials and citizens. He examined all the proposed sources of supply for the city and favored Salt River above any suggested. He said an adequate supply could be secured for an expenditure of between \$15,000 to \$18,000. There is a strong disposition among the citizens to put up a \$20,000 bond issue to secure pure water.

At a meeting of the city council Tuesday night \$400 was appropriated toward spreading oil on the streets; the fiscal court donated \$100 and the citizens committee will raise \$1,000 by contributions.

R. E. Claunch, a prominent citizen of the Dixville section had not been out of the county for ten years, until the other day he decided to take a vacation. He hitched up his nag to the surrey and took his wife and children on a driving trip thru Scott county and to Frankfort. He said that one thing that struck him forcibly in Frankfort was that the Old Taylor distillery is finer than any church building.

The Boy Scout minstrel Friday night at the Opera House was a good one and the lads cleared \$125. The Scouts have Rev. R. N. Simpson as a Master, and Bert Morgan for a band instructor.

Publishing Financial Statements

(Stanford Interior Journal)
This paper stated a few issues ago that here were several custodians of funds in the county who had not made the yearly publication of the collections and disbursements of those funds. We give herewith the law concerning such handling of public moneys, as well as the penalty for not giving the required publicity to such:

This section requires every public official of any county, graded school district, city, town or subdivision or district, less than a county, whose duty it is by virtue of his office to collect, receive, have the custody, control or disbursement of public funds of said county, city or town, except in counties containing a city of the first class or a county or city which by law is required to make quarterly publications of fiscal and financial affairs; shall at the expiration of each fiscal year prepare an itemized, sworn statement of such funds so collected, received, held or disbursed by him during the fiscal year just closed, which statement shall show the amount of public funds collected and received and from what sources received; the amount disbursed, the date of each disbursement, for what purpose expended and to whom paid. Section Kentucky Statutes 3747 A-1.

Any public official who shall fail, refuse or neglect to comply with the provisions of Section 3747 A-1 of this act, shall be deemed guilty of misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof, shall be fined not less than \$50.00 nor more than \$500.00 at the discretion of the court or jury trying the case. Section Kentucky Statutes 3747 A-2.

RETAIL WHISKEY TAX ON APRIL 30

Kentucky's sales tax of 13 cents a pint on whiskey sold at retail will become effective at 2 a. m. (E. S. T.) April 30. The bill was signed on Thursday afternoon by Governor Chandler and carried a provision making it effective three weeks from the date it was signed.

Political Speeches Useless

I am curious to know how many of my readers are afflicted in the same curious manner as I am as a result of listening to a public speech. Here are a couple of illustrations:

A group of Big Shot executives held a convention in an eastern city and for three days addressed fiery speeches to each other, and presumably to the public, in denunciation of almost everything. Compelled to suffer through the entire session, I started out in somewhat general agreement with the speakers. On the second day I found myself cooling and on the third day in almost complete disagreement with their views.

Shortly thereafter I was compelled to suffer for my sins by having to listen to two speeches from the other side. Both gentlemen labored earnestly to win us and belabored vigorously all those who differed with them. When they had finished speaking I was right back where I had started.

Now both sets of speakers were making perspiring efforts to strengthen their causes and both succeeded, so far as I was concerned, in doing the very opposite. Their positions would have been stronger had they never talked at all.

These experiences confirmed a doubt long held by me that rarely if ever does a political speech do any good. I once asked my father if he had ever known of any man who was persuaded to change his views by listening to a public address.

He answered: "Yes, it happened once. When I was a preacher in a small town in Ohio there were two old fellows, one was a confirmed Methodist and the other a Baptist. They agreed to a debate. As a result of it the Methodist converted the Baptist and the Baptist converted the Methodist. Each died in the opposite faith."

WPA AID FOR PRINCIPLE STREETS IN DANVILLE

Hugh Crozier, Harrodsburg, WPA project officer for Danville district has announced that seven of the principle streets in Danville will be reconstructed, the work starting immediately.

The total cost of the project will be \$11,567, and the WPA will furnish \$7,795. The city of Danville will furnish \$3,572, of which amount \$1,565 is for rental of city-owned equipment; \$902 for supervision by the city engineer; \$693 for superintendency by city employees; \$446 for materials and the remainder for labor.

The streets that will be reconstructed are Walnut, Main, Fourth, Third, Lexington, Broadway and Second.

Work That Goes On

My good friend Roy Chapin, head of the Hudson Motor Car Company, died recently at the too early age of fifty-seven. Back in the early '20's, when he looked like a rosy-faced boy, he was president of the National Automobile Chamber of Commerce. I was chatting with him at the annual dinner of the Chamber, and he told me this story:

"I left the University of Michigan at the end of my sophomore year and got a job with R. E. Olds, who was working on his first little one-cylinder Oldsmobile. One day we started out for a trial spin and had travelled only a few blocks when something happened and the car stopped.

"Mr. Olds said: 'You sit here while I go around the corner where there's a chap who runs a bicycle repair shop. I think he can fix us up.' A moment later Mr. Olds returned with an alert mechanic who promptly got down on his back, wiggled under the machine, made the repair, wiggled out, brushed himself off, and accepted a quarter with thanks.

"That man was Henry Ford."
This is the kind of story we used to tell each other in this country, with much pride. In those days each one of us thought in his heart that he himself might be rich some day. Or, if not he, then his son or his grandson. We thought it was the glory of America that in one generation a hard working young fellow could rise from "overalls" to the command of a great institution. The current philosophy seems to be that any man who has arisen to the command of a great institution must, ipso facto, be wrong. This is just a passing phase, one of those brief intervals that afflict a nation from time to time. This will pass and the work of the builders like Roy Chapin will go on.

ON "RELIEF"

Miss Nannie Steele, aged about 75 years, collapsed on the street in Newport one day last week. She was taken to the hospital for treatment and it was found that her purse contained stocks valued at \$5,740 and \$281.50 in cash. Miss Steele was on the Campbell county relief rolls and had been receiving a \$12 indigent check from the government each month in addition to other provisions and medical treatment. Yet we have people who say that the relief rolls do not need a thorough inspection.

ALL EGGS ALIKE IN RICHNESS

It is a widespread and popular belief that brown eggs are more nutritious than white ones. However there is no good reason to be found to support such a belief. Chemical analysis has shown that all eggs, regardless of color, are composed of virtually the same constituents. Eggs are designed by nature for the development of chicks and not to be eaten. LIGHT ON TOP OF CAR TATTLES ON SPEEDERS

Paul Danielsson, Stockholm, Sweden, engineer, has invented a speed indicator to be placed on top of automobiles so that traffic law violators can be detected from a distance.

An electric lamp, displayed above the windshield, shows white at 30 kilometers an hour. If the speed is accelerated, the light gradually turns green. And at 60 kilometers an hour or over it flares brightly red.

UNIQUE HOUSE

On the campus of Western Kentucky Teachers College at Bowling Green, there is one of the most unusual recreational centers to be found on any college campus in the South. The building which is known as the Cedar House, was erected almost entirely by voluntary student labor and is made of huge cedar logs cut from the Western campus.

The idea of the Cedar House originated with the class of 1920 which chose this means of making a permanent contribution to the student life of the Hill and at the same time saving the extraordinary growth of cedar which was being destroyed on the campus by a blight. The classes of 1921 and 1922, assisted by the general student body, carried on the work inaugurated by their predecessor, and funds for the completion of the building were raised by various musical and dramatic programs arranged by the students.

Although the original purpose, specified by the builders was that of a club house for the senior class, the scope of service has widened and the building now serves as a recreational mecca for individual students, as well as for the various club and social activities of the school. "Open house" is observed throughout the day and evening under the direction of the faculty hostesses.

LIGHTHOUSE ABANDONED

When built in 1870, the lighthouse was a mile from the water's edge but now the ocean is less than 100 feet from the tower's base.
