IRISH PLAN TO DISTILL

20,000 ACRES OF POTATOES

The Irish Free State Government has engaged a Czechoslovakian firm to establish and equip five industrial alcohol distilleries in Ireland. The estimated cost will be approximately \$350,000. It is pointed out that if a 10 per cent mixture of alcohol be required in motor fuels consumed in the country, a potential home market for about 4,000,000 gallons of industrial alcohol exists, providing an outlet for 20,000 acres of potatoes.

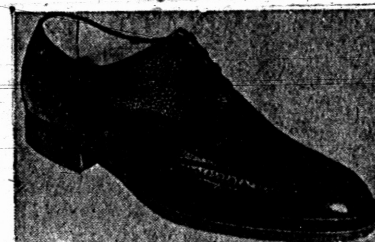
