

## New Bill Saves State Farmers \$200,000

Farmers of Kentucky will save \$200,000 this next year as the result of the Wheeler-Gillette bill extending for one year the emergency 3 1/2 per cent interest rate on Federal Land Bank loans, Myron G. Grigg, vice president and treasurer of the Federal Land Bank in Louisville, stated.

The measure was signed by President Roosevelt last week.

"But for this action of Congress in continuing the present rate the current billings of the Land Bank on its July maturities would have been based on a 4 per cent interest rate, in accordance with the Farm Credit Act of 1935," Grigg declared. "The new law gives a full additional year of 3 1/2 per cent interest on

Land Bank loans, of which more than 14,000 are outstanding in Kentucky."

Emergency interest reductions on Land Bank loans was authorized by Congress and placed in effect by banks in 1935. Grigg explained, pointing out that former emergency interest arrangements brought cash savings to Kentucky farmers during the five year period amounting to \$1,118,000. The additional one-half per cent provided by the new law increases the savings for the period to \$2,318,000 Grigg said, and farmers of the Fourth Farm Credit Administration District, comprising Ohio, Indiana, Kentucky and Tennessee, are saved \$1,035,000 additionally as a result of the new law, or a total of \$11,929,000 during the five year period.
