

June Term, 1921-

To the Honorable Judge of Mercer County Court:

Your petitioner, W. R. Crisp, respectfully represents that he has continuously been since January 1, 1907, and now is, a bona fide residen of the State of Kentucky, and now resides in Mercer County, in said State.

He states that he did actual military service in the Confederate army from the date of his enlistment until the close of the war, and was in prison at said time at Camp Douglas, in the State of Illinois.

He states that he is of the age of seventy-eight (78) years; that he is not able to earn a support by reason of any knowledge, art or skill in any profession, trade or craft, and that he does not receive a pension from the United States, State or any foreign Government, or from any other source; and that he has never removed from this State, or lived outside of said State for a period of three months or any time. He states that the amount of property which he owns does not exceed in value the sum of \$2200.00, and that his income from the same, or from any other source, does not exceed the sum of \$140.00, and that he has no wife living; and that his wife now dead left no property from which this petitioner derives or may derive any benefit. He states that no provision has been made by any person, by contract, agreement or otherwise, with any person able to provide support for this petitioner, and that he is not able to earn or obtain an income equivalent to \$300.00, or any sum greater than \$140.00 as aforesaid.

WHEREFORE, the petitioner prays for all orders, judgments or decrees to which a Confederate soldier is entitled as pensioner or to enable him to receive a pension from the Kentucky State Government, as such Confederate Soldier.
