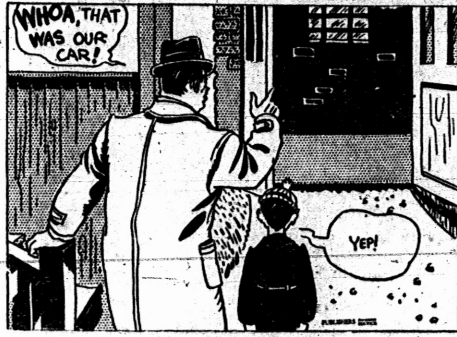


THE HOUSE OF HAZARDS

SPINAL MENINGITIS BAN SET IN HARLAN COUNTY

Confronted with an alarming spread of spinal meningitis, which has caused 32 deaths within a month, the Harlan County Medical Association last week voted to put the entire county under quarantine in an effort to check the disease. The quarantine became effective Friday morning by an order issued by Dr. W. P. Caywood, county health officer. Schools were allowed to remain open but all public gatherings were banned. Churches, theaters, pool rooms and other meeting places were closed.

The order provided that the 14 schools already closed in the various communities in the county could be reopened or left closed, depending on the opinion of local authorities.

We Want To Feel Better

A man who is much disturbed by what he calls the "forgotten habit of church attendance" asks me to write a piece on that subject. From rather limited observation, it has seemed to me that church attendance has been better since times became worse. If this observation be correct, it only bears out the record of past experience.

Years ago Roger Babson made a study which proved in most interesting and conclusive fashion that people tend to neglect the church in boom times and go back to it when prosperity has fled. A boom begets big-headedness, conceit, extravagance, self-will; all these are enemies to humility and faith, and all evaporate in a deflation.

My father, who was a clergyman, used to say: "It does not surprise me that more people do not go to church. On the contrary, I am forever being amazed that so many do go." He went on to ask: "Why do people go?" And he answered by saying that they go to hear themselves called sinners, to be told that they have done wrong during the week and have been a disappointment to themselves and the angels; they go to be asked to give money and to be told that they do not give enough. All this, said my father, is a program so rigorous that the wonder is that anybody continues to ask for it.

He might have added that people who have been regular church attendants in recent years have had to listen to an awful lot of second-hand economics.

Those people who went to listen to the Founder of the Church heard a good deal about their social obligations, but they heard, also, that they were great people, with infinite capacities—children of the Almighty and heirs of eternal life. At the close of the sermon they felt encouraged, not discouraged; better, not worse.

This cannot be said of some church congregations today.

We'll Always Be Fallible

It is my painful duty to report that the human race is in a bad way, and to submit in evidence a number of remarks made recently by thoughtful citizens at luncheon and dinner tables.

First remark, by the president of a large corporation: "I have revised my will and eliminated the clause which named a Trust Company as administrator. My observation of the action of trust companies during this depression convinces me that they do not know anything."

Second remark, by an intelligent woman: "I have no use for doctors. Most of the time they are merely guessing. They have the lucky advantage of being able to bury their mistakes."

Third remark: "When the lawyers talk about 'cleaning up the bar' they know it is just talk and that nothing will be done. They want the law to be intricate and involved because that makes more work for lawyers."

Fourth remark: "I don't read advertising any more; it is so exaggerated and misleading." Each of these remarks reminded me of the very wise advice of an older editor when, years ago, I was placed in charge of a magazine. He said: "You are going to discover that there are no efficient people in the world. You will explain an idea to a writer, and he will seem to understand, but when he delivers the finished article it won't be at all what you want. You will think an artist has a clear notion of the kind of picture you want, but when he brings it in it will be a hundred per cent wrong."

All of which sums up to this—the human race is made up of a great many millions very fallible human beings. On the whole, they try their best, but their batting average is low; it always will be low just because they are human and limited and fallible. If you proceed on that assumption you never are disappointed, and every now and then you get a very cheering surprise.

WHERE OLD CLOTHES GO

Have you ever wondered about the fate of the millions of old suits, dresses, stockings, hats and other articles of wearing apparel that are discarded by their owners each year? Of course, many of them are re-sold by the second hand clothes shops and for the cheap export trade to the natives in Africa. But countless garments are too worn and shabby for further use in this way. They are little more than rags. But even rags are in demand.

Linen and cotton garments are the most valuable, and are sold to the mills for re-making into cloth, or into fine papers. Artificial silk stockings are sorted, processed and re-woven into new. Felt from old hats can also be reclaimed and used again. Old suits are cleaned, disinfected and torn into shreds by machinery then re-woven. The coarse scraps of disintegrated cloth can be used in the manufacture of upholstery and bedding.

BIBLE IN PRISONER'S EFFECTS

A counterpart of Mark Twain's famous character, the old preacher who carried a pistol, a flask, a deck of cards, and a Bible, appeared in police court at Middlesboro recently to answer to a charge of drunkenness. Although not an ordained minister, the prisoner in question was carrying a variety of inappropriate articles, including a pistol, a knife, and a Bible. The charge of drunkenness was dismissed, and he was held to Bell county grand jury on a charge of carrying a concealed, deadly weapon. In the event he is unable to make the \$500 bond set, he will, no doubt have an abundance of time to read the Bible.—Middlesboro News.

MEASURES MOVEMENTS OF THE HUMAN EYE

At University of Rochester Dr. Wallace Osgood Fenn and his associate, taking advantage of the fact that when the human eye moves it generates a slight electric current, invented a metre which bridges the face from temple to temple, makes a record of eye movements. They found that a subject moves his eyes about five times while reading a line of print, keeps his gaze fixed when shaking his head, moves his eyes before he moves his head when looking to the side.

UNIVERSITY SHORT COURSE FOR PASTORS

Dates for the annual short course for town and country pastors at the University of Kentucky are announced as April 20-25, inclusive. The course is a cooperative project of the Kentucky Rural Church Council and the department of farm economics of the College of Agriculture. Lectures this year will include Dr. M. A. Dawber, of Philadelphia, who is in charge of the rural work of the Methodist church, and Dr. G. C. Dobbins, of the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary, Louisville.

The course is non-denominational and open to all pastors and laymen. As a result of the interest of pastors last year in discussions and demonstrations dealing with agriculture, increased emphasis will be presented in order to give those attending a better insight into and understanding of the everyday problems of their congregations.

16,390 UNEMPLOYABLES IN STATE, SURVEY REVEALS

A survey by the division of finance and statistics of the KERA showed this week there are 16,390 unemployed persons in Kentucky and 28,035 dependent on them. The percentage in relation to population is 1.7.

Franklin county, where only 2 per cent of the population is unemployed had the least number. Other counties with a low unemployment included Bracken and Fayette 1.6, and Scott 1.6.

Wolfe county with 6.9 had the highest percentage of unemployed. Other counties far above the average, most of them in eastern Kentucky, are Leslie 5.8; Menifee 5.5; Rowan and Carlisle 4.8; Elliott 5.1; Cumberland 4.3; Wayne 4.

DR. JILLSON TO SOON ISSUE NEW KY. BOOK

Dr. Willard Rouse Jillson, of Frankfort, who is well known here, is soon to issue a new historical book, "Big Bone Lick" which in the opinion of many pre-publication readers, is the ablest that has come from this pen. Dr. Jillson, 46 years of age, is the creator of 46 books and more than 100 pamphlets. Although not a native Kentuckian—he was born in middle New York—he has lived in this state for 20 years and has contributed much to the annals of early Kentucky history. His last book has for its theme the once famous, but now almost forgotten place, sealed over with the dust of time, the Big Bone Lick in Boone county, Kentucky.

ONE PLACE THAT STOPS DRUNKEN DRIVERS

Under a law in Sweden, persons convicted on a charge of drunken driving must serve a term of imprisonment without option of a fine. Invoked during the year 1935, the police record shows a reduction of 34 per cent for this offense over the previous year.

KENTUCKY TRIPLETS ARE GAINING WEIGHT

Kentucky's Friday the Thirteenth triplets have gained two and a half pounds each since their birth in a lonely mountain cabin near Soldier, Ky., on Friday, December 13, 1935.

The triplets—two girls and a boy—weighed seven pounds at birth. Their parents, Mr. and Mrs. Everett Porter, say they have had several offers from persons wanting to adopt the babies, and that they have received funds from persons throughout the country, which helped in the early battle to keep the infants alive. The father has been without a job for many months, but through the kindness of neighbors the family has been fed.

The tiny mountain cabin, the birthplace of Nellie, Nettie and Norman, as the triplets have been named, is situated three miles from a paved road.

FARMERS PAY U. S. LOANS BEFORE NOTES ARE DUE

Governor Myers of the Farm Credit Administration said this week farmers were repaying the money they owe the Government much more rapidly than required by their contracts.

In a statement showing repayment of \$43,000,000 to Federal Land Banks in 1935, Myers said the amount was larger than the regular principal amortization on all outstanding Federal Land Bank loans.

Myers said only \$40,900,000 would have been due in regular payments. The Governor said \$15,000,000 of loans were paid in full during the year and interest payments had shown steady improvement, since the low points in 1933.

2,155,000 VETERANS APPLY FOR BONUS

President Roosevelt was told yesterday that up to March 5, 2,155,000 ex-soldiers had applied for the bonus.

Brigadier General Frank T. Hines, head of the veterans' administration, made the report in a morning call at the White House.
