FALSE ECONOMY NOT TO PUBLISH DOG'S OWNERS

(Carlisle Mercury)
Our news columns this week tell
that more than \$4,000 in sheep
claims on file in the office of the
sheriff of Nicholas county remain un-
paid and that the list is growing
larger. The next claim that will be
paid was filed in June, 1932.

About \$1,000 annually is collected
from the dog licensing tax in this
county, Sheriff Leer states. Natural-
ly we shall fall farther behind each
year, unless all dogs in the county
are licensed. And who believes that
there are no more dogs than that in
Nicholas county?

Conditions were much better and
many more dogs were licensed a few
years ago, when the publication of
names of dog-owners was required.
It is quite natural and human for a
man to resent paying a license tax
on his dog, if his neighbor does not.
Under the present system, he doesn't
know. When names were published
he did know and he told and the un-
licensed dog owner was ferreted out.
The legislature that repealed the
act requiring publication of dog
owners of the county was practicing
false economy.
