FOUND DRUNK IN COURT HOUSE, GETS 30 DAYS

Albert "Cutie" Devine, 18, Harrodsburg, was sentenced to 30 days in jail by County Judge Charles T. Corn Friday when the official found the youth leaning on the door to a room in which women are working on the sewing project in the basement of the court house. Devine was intoxicated, Judge Corn said.

Judge Corn only recently declared that he was going to break up drinking and drunkenness in the court house and has since fined and sent to jail several persons found guilty of this offense. Devine is now on parole from the state reformatory for his guilt in connection with theft of cigarettes from a Harrodsburg business house. Judge Corn said Friday that he would notify Circuit Judge Kendrick S. Alcorn of Devine's conduct.

JUDGE ORDERS THAT BOYS BE WHIPPED

Judge Chas. Corn held a brief session of juvenile court Saturday afternoon in which he ordered the parents of two boys to give them a sound whipping and then to report to him every two weeks about the boys' behavior with the threat of a reform school sentence hanging over each boy.

The boys were James Hardin, 10 years old, and Richard Donehl, 9, the latter a Negro. The boys were brought to Judge Corn by Patrolman Jim Shirley who charged that they had been throwing rocks at the live stock and people at the stockyards and otherwise making themselves general nuisances by their antics.

Judge Corn gave each youth a lecture in front of his parents and told them he would send the boys to the reform school if their behavior was in the least bit questionable in the future. Both boys' parents promised to administer the whippings recommended by Judge Corn.

BURGIN YOUTH ACCEPTED AS RECRUIT IN U. S. NAVY

Lowell R. Jackson, son of Mr. and Mrs. H. L. Jackson, Burgin, has been ordered to report today to the Navy Recruiting Station at Louisville for enlistment in the United States Navy.

After being accepted for enlistment Jackson and other recruits will be sent to the U. S. Navy Training Station at Norfolk, Va., where they will undergo three months' of intensive training. Upon completion of this training they are then sent to one of the various trade schools for further training or direct to sea on one of the nation's many warships.

YOUTH IS FIGHTING FOR FOOT ON LADDER

Thirty-four per cent of the youth in the United States today are "out of work out of school, or in relief families."

The percentage is based on statistics of the National Youth Administration. They show that of the 23,000,000 young people in this country between the ages of 16 and 25, some 15,000,000 are "located" either in school or at work. The remaining 8,000,000 are members of relief families and jobless.

It is also reported that approximately 300,000 young people now on relief never have had a job.

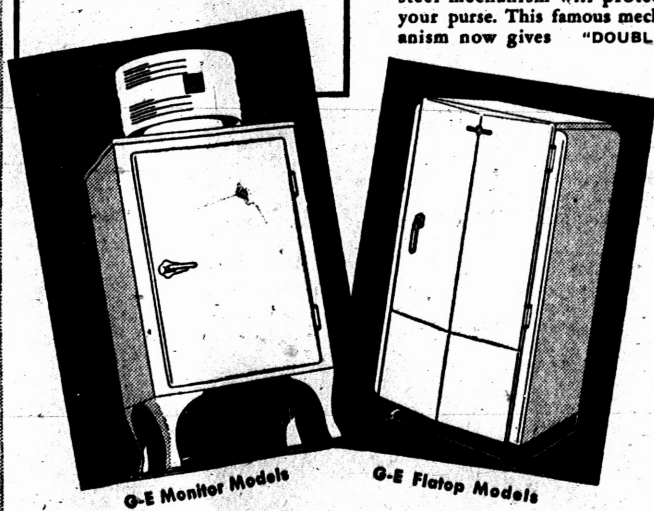
