HEROES OF AMERICAN HISTORY

The
LAST OF THE
GREAT SCOUTS

COLONEL
WILLIAM FREDERICKS
CODY
BUFFALO BILL



Born in Scott County, Iowa, William F. Cody, at 14, joined the "Pony Express," that group of daring riders who, braving Indians and bandits and living on the constant edge of death, carried the mails from Missouri to California.

Cody once undertook to supply the workmen on the Kansas Pacific Railway with buffalo meat and so well did he succeed that he became known as Buffalo Bill. In 1876 Cody was with the U. S. Cavalry that went to avenge the death of Gen. Custer. He encountered Yellow Hand, the Cheyenne Indian Chief, in a hand-to-hand contest, fought with knives, and slew him. In 1883 Cody organized the "Wild West Show," a spectacular performance of difficult riding and shooting feats, which became popular and later toured Europe. He lies buried in a tomb that was blasted from solid rock on Lookout Mountain, about twenty miles from Denver, Colorado.

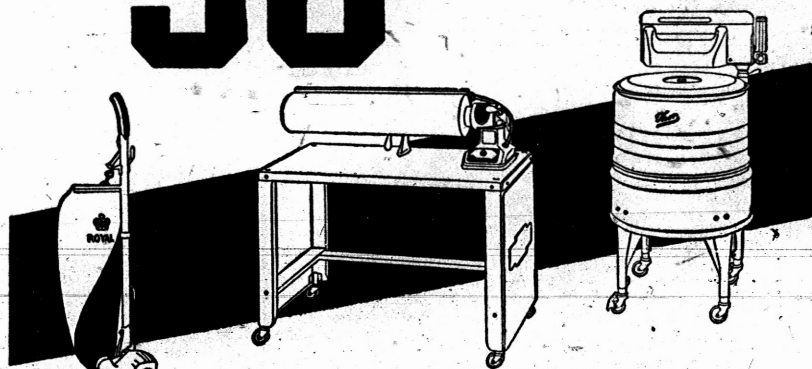
