Prayer

Our Heavenly Father, we come to Thee this morning in the name of Thy Son, Jesus Christ, thanking Thee for redeeming love, for the faith of our fathers, living still, in spite of dungeon, fire and sword; for the hope of the resurrection and life immortal. We praise Thee, from whom all blessings flow, for all Thy benefits toward human kind. In the midst of war and rumors of war, we thank Thee for the peace of God which passeth human understanding. We beseech Thee to bless us as we labor this day in Thy vineyard. Whatever our occupations, whatever problems we may face, however our souls may be tried, help us this day to be conquerors through Jesus Christ. We pray that we may grow in grace and in the knowledge of Jesus Christ; and when the day comes to a close may we truthfully say, "One more day's work for Jesus." Guide us all through the changing scenes of life, and when the shadows of life's evening come, may we sing, "Oh, how sweet it will be in that beautiful land, so free from all sorrow and pain, with songs on our lips and with harps in our hands, to meet one another again." We ask these things in Jesus' Name, Amen.

"Love, God's Greatest Gift."

The text is found in I Corinthians the thirteenth chapter and the thirteenth verse: "And now abideth faith, hope, love, these three; but the greatest of these is love." "Faith is the substance of things hoped for; the evidence of things not seen." "Faith is to believe what we do not see, and the reward of this faith is to see what we believe." A salvation army inmate said: "I don't know what's in the future, but I know the Lord is in the future, and I know I am in the Lord." When Joseph was dying he showed his great faith by making mention of the departing of the children of Israel, and gave commandment concerning his bones, as he wanted to be buried in the promised land. A poet and an artist examined a painting by Poussin, representing the healing of two blind men of Jericho. The artist asked: "What seems to you the most remarkable thing in this painting?" The poet said: "Everything in the painting is excellently given, the form of Christ, the grouping of the individuals, the expression in the faces of the leading characters." The artist said to his friend, pointing to the steps of a house in the corner of the picture: "Do you see that discarded cane lying there?" "Yes, but what does that signify?" "Why, my friend, on those steps the blind man sat with the cane in his hand, but when he heard Christ come he was so sure that he would be healed that he let his cane lie there, since he would need it no more, and hastened to the Lord as if he could already see. Is not that a wonderful conception of the confidence of faith?"

Another great gift of God to man, is the gift of hope. Whittier said: "Behind the cloud the starlight lurks, Through showers the sunbeams fall; For God who loveth all His works, Has left His Hope with all."

Wat's picture of hope shows the figure of a woman sitting above the world, playing forever upon the string of a harp, a single string, for all the others are broken. At first it seems bitter, but that is a picture of every man in every age who has tackled the mystery of life. We are all playing upon some last string or other, and we realize that the finest, bravest music in all the world is made that way. Dr. G. Campbell Morgan or a man whose shop had been burned in the Chicago fire, he arrived at the ruins the next morning carrying a table. He set it up amid the charred debris, and above it placed this optimistic sign, "Everything lost except wife, children and hope. Business will be resumed as usual tomorrow." On the pier at Brighton, England, stands a sun-dial on which is inscribed this most hopeful line, "Tis always morning somewhere in the world."

"And now abideth faith, hope, love, these three; but the greatest of these is love." Lew Wallace said:

"The happiness of love is in action; its test is what one is willing to do for others." Jesus proved His love for humanity by His actions. He healed the sick, raised the dead, and caused people to leap for joy by bringing to the captive soul release from bondage, and giving to them a love that failed not. A Christian woman visited her son in college. She found some things in his room she did not want there. She hung Hoffmann's beautiful picture of Christ on the wall. Months later she went to his room and said: "William, you have made some changes since I was here." Looking up to the picture of Christ, he said: "Mother, those things would not fit in with Him." If we love Christ we will keep His commandments, and His commandments are not grievous. Service performed from loving hearts is a delight. We can get to the place in our Christian lives here we serve Christ and love Him not merely out of gratitude for what He has done for us, but we serve Him because we have fallen in love with His personality—we love Him for what He is. When we get to heaven we will still serve—serve in the spirit of divine love. In heaven we will no longer need faith, because faith will be changed into sight. It is very probable that we will need no hope, as all will be joy and bliss—but we will need LOVE. "And now abideth faith, hope, these three, but the greatest of these is love."

SPEED, LOAD LIMIT ON TRUCKS IS LIFTED
Chairman Ben Johnson of the state highway commission last week entered an order lifting the ban previously set on excessive weight and speeds of trucks using the highways of Kentucky.

The ban, imposed the previous week to remain in effect until April 1 because of road conditions brought about by the freeze and thaw, limited the gross weight of trucks to 13,000 pounds and their speed to 25 miles per hour. State highway patrolmen were given authority to enforce the ruling but no arrests have been heard of in this locality.

Four Mercer Youths May Attend C.M.T.C.

Four vacancies for this summer's Citizens' Military Training Camp remain open to young men from Mercer county, it was announced by Major General William E. Cole, U. S. Army, commanding Fifth Corps Area, under whose direction 3200 C.M.T.C. candidates will be trained during July and August this year.

Promotion will be necessary to gain acceptance for the C.M.T.C. teams, because of the large number of early applications being received at Army headquarters, Fort Hayes, Ohio. Young men of good character and sound physique who are between 17 and 24 years old are eligible. All necessary expenses are paid by the government, including fare to camp and return, uniforms, wholesome food, athletic equipment, laundry service, and medical attention. No obligation for future military service is incurred by those attending a C.M.T.C. camp.
