Trial of 'Bro. Moore's' Killer Again Delayed

At the March term of the Anderson circuit court opening in Lawrenceburg Monday, the case of Dave Cheatham, charged with voluntary manslaughter growing out of the death of the beloved Rev. W. D. Moore, who was injured in an automobile accident, was postponed until the June term of the court. Cheatham, alleged to have been driving a car while drunk on primary election day August 3, 1935, ran into a car in which the aged minister was being driven by J. W. Bogges to an appointment, and he was fatally hurt in the collision.

Rev. W. D. Moore was pastor of Shawnee Run Baptist church in Mercer county for about 30 years. There was hardly a church in this community in which he had not held services. Cheatham's case has been postponed several times by his attorney. Sentiment against him was very strong following the death of the minister.

Stone 'Fish' Found Near City Creek

An almost perfect object that appears to be a petrified fish was upturned from the soil Monday by Howard Bishop while plowing the garden at his home on Litsey avenue. The "fish" is 17 inches long and 5 inches across the widest section of its body. What is apparently an eye is plainly visible on one side and the indentation for a mouth. No fins or tail are left, as they would sluff off in the course of ages while the petrifying process was going on, if the object were really what it seems. The side on which the "fish" was lying is flatter and not so perfect as the upper side.

Judge Charles T. Corn took the curiosity to Lexington last week and showed it to Dr. Funkhouser, Department of Zoology and Anthropology, University of Kentucky. Dr. Funkhouser declared that it was merely a freak of nature and was not the petrified fish that it resembled. He added that the rock was of no value. The garden in which the rock was found is near a stream that flows back of Litsey avenue and which formerly was much larger than it is now, thus adding to the first impression that the find was a petrified fish.
