Correlation of attendance and grades. The percentage for the four upper grades represent those who have averaged "B" or better for the entire semester, or half of the year. If you will notice the figures you will see the 4th year students have the highest per cent on the honor roll and likewise the 1st year high school students have the lowest per cent.

It also checks that the class having the most nearly perfect attendance has the highest per cent on the honor roll; and likewise the lowest attendance has lowest average. In no case is there a honor pupil with low attendance. Very few cases of poor attendance and good grades. The only cases are those who were sick and could not be present, but continued to keep up with the assignments.

Including the upper six grades (which is 7th and 8th and high school) there were 40% with perfect attendance.

PICKING DRUNKEN DRIVERS PERPLEXES GAS DEALERS

Canton, Ohio's city council has forbidden the sale of gasoline to drunken drivers and thereby presented filling station attendants with a problem that has puzzled sociologists. An ordinance prohibiting dealings with inebriated made no suggestions as to how the station attendants might determine when a driver is intoxicated.

Scores of attendants called their division managers and city officials to ask how to decide whether a driver is drunk. None got a confident answer.

The ordinance provides a fine of not less than \$25 nor more than \$500 and a jail sentence of not less than 10 days nor more than 30 days for any service station attendant convicted of violating it.

Infection also may enter the middle ear he warned, "if we blow our noses too vigorously."

"A good practical rule would be never to blow the nose so loudly it can be heard ten feet away."

HOT AIR LAYER 200 MILES UP

New discoveries are making our air layers, which blanket the earth to the depth of several hundred miles, more and more complicated. According to Dr. E. E. Free, Prof. E. V. Appleton, British radio expert, has made tests which indicate that a shell of air, intensely hot, exists 200 miles above the surface of the

earth. Tests were made with short radio waves. Because of the apparent highly ionized state of the air in that locality it is believed that there is a layer there that has been heated to about 1,600 degrees Fahrenheit by absorption of some of the sun's rays.—Pathfinder.
