## FRIEND

Mrs. Mary E. Friend, 77 years old, died Monday, June 1, 1936, at one o'clock in the morning at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Fred Thomas Martin, and Mr. Martin, near Harrodsburg. Mrs. Friend was the daughter of John and Mary Jones Kentch, and was born and reared in Wayne county, Iowa. She was the widow of William Friend who died 24 years ago, and came to Harrodsburg some years ago with her daughter and family. She was greatly esteemed by those who knew her.

Surviving are two daughters, Mrs. A. C. Crain, Phoenix, Arizona; Mrs. Fred Thomas Martin, Harrodsburg, and two sons, Marc L. Friend, Quinta, Kansas, and William E. Friend, Santa Anna, California. Mrs. Friend was a member of the Congregationalist church. A brief funeral service was held Monday afternoon in the chapel at the Alexander and Royalty funeral home, conducted by Rev. T. Hassell Bowen, of the Christian church. That same evening Mrs. Martin left with her mother for Salina, Kansas, where the funeral was held Thursday and burial followed in the family lot in the cemetery there beside her husband.

## NELSON

Mr. Nelson was a well known monument man and stone cutter while here. For the past ten years he had been a guard at Delco Plant No. 1, where he was known to all the force as "Dad." ## PLAN SET UP TO PAY BONUS

Postal officials at Washington said that machinery has been set up to assure quick payment of bonus money to veterans who desire to cash their "baby bonds" after they are distributed in June.

Following is the procedure outlined by officials:  
A veteran applies for payment of his bonus certificate in \$50 bonds by sending an application blank with his fingerprints and other data to the nearest office of the veterans' administration.

After it has checked over the application, the veterans' administration certifies the application to the treasury department.

The treasury department makes out an order for the proper number of \$50 bonds, plus a check to cover any odd amount. These are sent to the federal reserve bank in the veteran's district.

The federal reserve bank makes up a bundle for each veteran, containing as many \$50 bonus "baby bonds" as the veteran is owed, plus the check to cover the odd amount.

## NEW STAMP TO MARK TEXAS CENTENNIAL

Gonzales, Texas, where the first shot in the Texas colonists' struggle for freedom from Mexico was fired more than 100 years ago, is preparing for a rush of stamp collectors on March 2, for on that date the special Texas Centennial 3-cent postal stamp will first be placed on sale at the Gonzales postoffice.

The Texas Centennial stamp will be printed in purple ink and will be enclosed in a double-line border. Within upright oval panels on either side will appear likenesses of Sam Houston and Stephen F. Austin. In the upper center of the stamp, over a large white star, will be the inscription, "United States Postage, Texas Centennial, 1836-1936," arranged in three horizontal lines. The lower part of the central design will be a reproduction of the Alamo, the chapel of which still stands in San Antonio, with the title in dark Gothic in a narrow horizontal panel at the lower edge of the stamp.

## SOMERSET BOY LOSES EYE IN SODA-VINEGAR EXPOSITION

Earl Tarter, 14, son of Mason Tarter, of Naomi, lost his left eye Tuesday afternoon as a result of an experiment he made with soda and vinegar. The boy, who makes his home with his grandmother, Mrs. Nancy Patton, poured some vinegar in a glass bottle, added some baking soda and screwed on the top. There was an immediate explosion, caused by the liberation of gas. The boy's father, working on a tobacco bed a mile away, heard the report of the explosion. Several pieces of glass struck the left eyeball, cutting the globular capsule in several places. At the Somerset General Hospital Tuesday night it was found necessary to remove the eye.—Somerset Commonwealth.

## NOT DOG MINDED

Central Kentucky is every year becoming more and more sheep minded. Farmers learn that they are able to raise spring lambs on that fine bluegrass land worth from \$100 to \$200 an acre at about 100 per cent profit.

Hardin county can raise on \$25, \$50 and \$100 an acre land sheep as profitable as the Bluegrass can raise them on \$200 an acre land. Instead of planting a crop of corn and harvesting a crop of fodder on a lot of thin land in this county it should be sown in lespedeza and a flock of

sheep put on it. Corn impoverishes the land while sheep will yield a handsome profit. It is very much more profitable for our people to learn what Central Kentucky farmers have learned and to become sheep minded instead of dog minded.

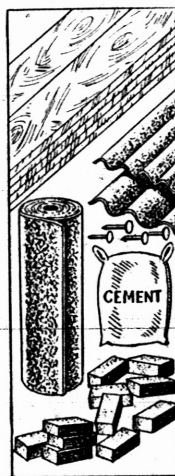
