SCHOOL YOUTHS IN BAD WRECK

J. C. Murphy, Senior, in Hospital With Serious Head Injuries; Tom Crutcher's Hurts Minor.

Still semi-conscious from head injuries received in an automobile wreck late Tuesday night, J. C. Murphy, 19, a member of the high school senior class, remained in a serious condition at the A. D. Price Memorial hospital, it was reported yesterday. The youth, in company with Tom Crutcher, 17, left the junior-senior dinner dance at Beaumont Inn, which they attended and drove to Danville. On the way back the car, driven by Crutcher, left the road at the bridge over Harrod's Run at the the bridge over Harrod's Run at the several times as it rolled down an embankment. Murphy received a fracture of the skull and severe injuries, while Crutcher escaped, with minor cuts and bruises.

He extricated himself from the wrecked car and stopped a truck on its way to Danville. The driver took the youths to a physician there, and they received first aid. Murphy was later brought to the hospital here. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Shelby Murphy, and Crutcher is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Leslie C. Crutcher. Both families reside at Shakertown. A blowout might have caused the wreck, garagemen who brought in the car, stated.

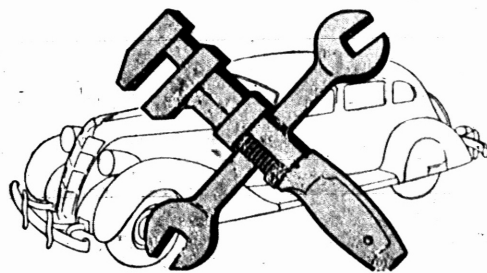
