

Sen. J. J. McBrayer, of Fayette Co. Announces For Congress In The 6th District



I take this occasion to announce my candidacy for the Democratic nomination for Congress in the Sixth Congressional District.

Old Age Pension Pay May Be Late In State

Announcement has been made at Frankfort that the payments of \$5,000,000 annual old age assistance grants in Kentucky will be delayed until August or September in order to give time for detailed investigations of every applicant as required by law, and for preliminary organization for the task.

Although the law providing old age assistance shall become effective July 1, indications are that it may be delayed until August or September in order to give time for detailed investigations of every applicant as required by law, and by preliminary organization for the task.

Although the law providing old age assistance shall become effective July 1, indications are that it may be Sept. 1 before the paying machinery is operating smoothly.

The manual of the old age assistance regulations prepared by the department of welfare is now ready for approval by Gov. Chandler. It is to be submitted to him within the next few days. The manual includes all application forms. Attorney-General E. M. Vincent has approved the proposed regulations as complying with Kentucky statutes and the constitution.

Frederick A. Wallis, chairman of the welfare department, said details of organization were being worked out as rapidly as possible, but that no definite announcement could be made at this time regarding either the date of beginning payments or the type of organization.

Application blanks, as prepared by the Welfare Department, along with other regulations, have been approved by the Federal Social Security Board, Chairman Wallis announced last Friday.

All persons who have written letters of application to the Welfare Department will receive application blanks as soon as they can be printed and distributed, Wallis said. Other blanks will be sent to the County Clerk's office where they may be filled out.

Kentuckians over 65 who have insufficient income to maintain a "reasonable" standard of living will be eligible to receive grants of not more than \$15 a month each. The Welfare Department will make a personal investigation of each case, and every applicant who has property will be required to give the State a lien to that property to cover the amount received.




