


Will Get New Chance in Life

Burgin Wins Countywide Net Tournament; Rose Hill Runner-up

The Burgin high school Bulldogs captured the honors of the Mercer basketball tournament Saturday night from the fighting Rose Hill team 29-22.

Burgin which was ahead 18 to 4 at the half, let down in the third period and Rose Hill, lead by Maurice Carpenter, scored 10 points in the last half and crept up on the Bulldogs and almost overcame their lead. However, the Bulldog regulars, who had been withdrawn at the half, re-entered the game, and the Rose Hill rally fell short 7 points. Maurice Carpenter, who scored all his 10 points in the second half, was best for Rose Hill and Sparrow was the high man for the Bulldogs with 11 points.

In acquiring the right to meet Burgin in the finals, Rose Hill defeated McAfee 29 to 17 and downed Salvisa Dragons 23 to 17. Rose Hill led McAfee 9 to 6 at the half, and it was not until the last quarter that Rose Hill acquired a good lead. In the game with Salvisa, Rose Hill was behind 5 to 3 at the end of the first quarter, but ahead 16 to 9 at the beginning of the fourth quarter. Maurice Carpenter, Rose Hill, was the best individual performer at the tournament by accounting for 19 of his team's 23 points.

Burgin reached the finals by beating Cornishville 39 to 21, and defeating Harrodsburg 40 to 14. Burgin took an early lead over Cornishville and held it throughout the game. Sparrow, Burgin, and James, Cornishville, with 10 points each were best for their respective teams. Burgin led Harrodsburg high school Pioneers 20 to 6 at the half. G. Gaskin paced Burgin with 10 points and Houchins was the outstanding

ASSEMBLY ADOPTS MANY MEASURES

Average 15 Bills Passed Daily During Session That Closed At 3:55 A.M. Sunday, Feb. 16.

The 1936 general assembly that adjourned its regular session sine die at 3:55 o'clock Sunday morning, Feb. 16, passed an average of 15 bills a day during the 33 working days of the session.

In addition to 107 miscellaneous measures that were written into the state books during the session, approximately 400 country roads were added to the state's primary system of highways in separate bills.

Sixty-three of the miscellaneous bills that were passed through both branches of the Legislature originated in the senate and 44 in the house. Most of the primary road projects

were house bills. Almost 500 other bills were killed.

Topping the list of the bills passed were 11 of the 13-points in Gov. Chandler's legislation. The other two points were not acted on by agreement between the administration and the legislature. One of them calling for the liquor control act was deferred until one of the series of special sessions of the Legislature slated to start Feb. 24. The other of the Governor's points providing for a one cent reduction in the gasoline tax, was defeated by the administration forces after the Governor decided on a reduction in the cost of automobile licenses instead of a cut in the gas tax.
