JERSEY COWS CAUTIONED—So many people do not look at the milking point of a Jersey cow. They sure do always count. By living with them 60 years I can very near give you some of the points now. She must have a small mouth, large nozle, long nose, dish face, prominent eyes, wide between the horns, slim neck, slim shoulders, good flat bony ribs, deep heart girth, well sprung legs to hold the food, deep from spine to udder, hips wide apart, long tail well set, and be sure it is below the hock (without some dog has pulled it off). As a general thing if the tail bone is not down to the hock, the cow is not much of a milker; if it is one inch below the hock she is very good, and if as much as two inches, she is the best, at least this is the way with the Island Bred ones. Every one knows there are exceptions to all rules, and it might be in this case. Now, the Jersey cow came from the Island of Jersey in the English Channel, it is longer than it is wide and if squared would be 6 1/2 miles and before the World War it had many thousand herds of cattle and many thousand head of people.
