EIGHT MORE COUNTIES PUT ON DROUGHT LIST

The emergency drought territory was swelled to 1,188 counties in twenty-four States Tuesday when eight additional counties in Kentucky were added to the official list by the Department of Agriculture.

The counties designated were Ballard, Barren, Carlisle, Christian, Graves, Metcalfe, Trigg and Warren.

All but seventeen Kentucky counties are now on the list.
