MRS. GROVER MAY BADLY HURT IN McAFEE MISHAP

Suffers Cut Forehead, Bruises, Shock
When Knocked Down By Car Of
W. O. Hayes, Somerset.

TRUCK OWNED BY HOLLY ROYALTY IS DAMAGED

Hayes' Car Skidded In Passing An-
other Auto And He Lost Control,
Thus Causing Accident.

Purchasing a box of candy proved a costly thing for Mrs. Grover May, of McAfee, Thursday morning, when she was injured as she stood beside a candy truck. She suffered a bad laceration over her eye, broken thumb, bruises, lacerations and shock. It is thought she is not critically hurt.

James Demeree, driving the truck for Holly Royalty, Harrodsburg, candy and tobacco merchant, had stopped in McAfee and Mrs. May was standing beside the truck on the side next to the road, making her purchase. Two cars approaching from opposite directions, met near the truck, and in pulling aside to pass, W. O. Hayes, of Somerset, lost control of his skidding car and it crashed into the truck and also struck Mrs. May, dragging her a short distance. The force of the collision was broken as Mr. Hayes had applied his brakes. Otherwise Mrs. May's injuries might have been more serious.

The truck was damaged and windshield and lights were broken. Sheriff Oscar Sanders was called but made no arrests. Demeree, the driver of the truck, was unhurt except for being shaken up. Mrs. May was not taken to the hospital but received medical attention at her home.

FOUR PROPERTIES SELL AT AUCTION

Three Farms Pass To New Owners
Within Week; Old Brick Building
Sold By Church.

Several properties have been sold in the last few days at public auction but no outstanding prices were realized. The V. C. Cloyd farm of 19 acres, one mile north of Salvisa on Highway 35, was bought by Van B. Carter, of McAfee, for \$5,000. The eight-room dwelling has furnace and all modern conveniences.

The 204 acre farm on the Jackson pike, offered for sale by George and Andrew Keenon, brought \$60 an acre. The place has a ten-room brick residence. The purchaser was Rodman W. Keenon, of Lexington. Possession January 1. Both these sales were tried by W. P. Hatchett.

The farm of 120 acres offered at auction by Claude Davenport, agent for the heirs of D. H. Davenport, was bought by Fred Davenport for \$3,310. It was announced by Glave Sims, the auctioneer. The place is on the Hopewell-Vanarsdall road, ten miles from Harrodsburg, and has a five room dwelling.

The old brick building on Office street adjacent to the Christian church and owned by the church, was sold by Joe Sandusky, chairman, and a committee entrusted with the sale. The purchaser was B. F. Pollard for \$40. The ground was not sold. Mr. Pollard will wreck the building and remove the bricks. John I. VanArsdale Realty Company conducted the sale.

SUES FOR ESTATE TO GO TO SCHOOL

Property Of Versailles Man Unclaimed
14 Years May Revert To
Education.

Almost 14 years having elapsed since the death of John Wenger, shoemaker, of Versailles, and no heirs having claimed his estate, Dr. Herbert Newman, chairman of the Versailles board of education, acting for the board, Monday instituted proceedings in the Woodford circuit court asking that the Wenger estate be declared forfeited to the board of education for the benefit of the public schools of the Versailles district, according to the Woodford Sun.

The petition in equity, filed by Attorney David L. Thornton, recites that under Kentucky acts of 1893 and 1920 unclaimed real estate and personal property of a decedent escheats to the commonwealth and shall vest in the board of education of the district in which the decedent resided, for the benefit and use of the schools of the district.

The property of the late Mr. Wenger is listed as consisting of three houses and lots and "money collected in rents and profits," belonging to the estate, in the Harris-Seller Bank. One piece of real estate is in Woodridgetown, on house on S. Main street and one on an alley leading from Macey avenue.

"Unknown heirs" A. B. Dawson, administrator of the Wenger estate, and the Harris-Seller Banking Company are named as defendants in the petition filed Monday.

John Wenger was born at Banff, Switzerland, and came to America when 30 years of age. He conducted a shoe shop in Versailles for nearly 40 years, was a bachelor and lived alone in a room, adjoining his shop. He was 72 years old when he died Dec. 4, 1922. Four sisters and a brother, all living in Switzerland, had preceded him to the grave. It was reported that a niece had lived in Oklahoma, but all efforts to locate her after Mr. Wenger's death failed.

MERCER CITIZENS JOIN PHONE RATE PROTEST TODAY

Delegation Headed By Mayor, County Judge, Chamber Commerce Men
Go To Frankfort.

TO ATTEND REHEARING REGARDING NEW RATES

Local Group Stands For Lower Rates, Free Rural Service, Modern Sets, and Better Service.

A delegation from Harrodsburg and Mercer county will go to Frankfort this morning to attend the hearing of the telephone rate question before the State Public Service Commission. The delegation will be headed by Mayor H. T. Adams, and Co. Judge Charles T. Corn with members of the Mercer Chamber of Commerce. The demand they will make will be for a lowering of the present telephone rates, lower than the previous order, a free county service and modern French telephone sets. To this they will add the plea for better service.

After hearing delegations from all sections of Kentucky who went before the Public Service Commission Monday, the order to lower the rates in cities and charge ten cents toll on all county lines, was set aside, and the regular rates in force were continued until the matter could be settled. Chairman J. C. W. Beckham did not indicate what his attitude would be, but granted the telephone users a rehearing today.

Those who spoke at the meeting Monday estimated the tolls would curtail inter-exchange service until in many localities a telephone would be useless, or if endured by the public, would yield the company additional revenue of \$2,000,000 to \$3,000,000 to supplant the \$516,000 reduction in connection charges.

The commission, in its deliberations that preceded the October 1 order, assumed the substantial accuracy of the company's estimate of \$100,000 yield from the proposed tolls. The company, starting off with an estimate of \$100,000 in July, reduced the estimate later to "around \$80,000."
