Football Dope

Driving with the fierceness and power of the Spanish insurgents, the Cadets of M. M. I. Friday night invaded Harrodsburg and handed the Pioneers of Coach Emmet Goranflo a severe 44 to 0 drubbing, the first loss for the locals in Central Kentucky Conference ranks this year.

Outweighed by approximately ten pounds to the man and dazzled by the swiftness of the invaders' attack, the Pioneers fought gamely to the end but did not show signs of their earlier season form until the last half, when they rallied to register five first downs.

The Cadets pushed over two

touchdowns early in the first quarter, three in the second period, were held scoreless in the third and got two more in the final quarter. Employing a deceptive offense that caught the locals off guard many times during the evening, the visitors displayed championship form in taking the victory and left Harrodsburg fans wondering how they were defeated in their opening game of the season by Lancaster.

Twice during the game the Pioneers drove deep into Cadet territory, going to the 35 yard line in the third quarter only to lose the ball on an intercepted pass. Again in the closing minutes of the game, the Pioneers showed streaks of their former selves and chalked up two successive first downs. On the final play of the game, Best heaved a forward pass to Sadler, who was downed on the M. M. I. 30 yard line stripe.

The visitors attack could well be classed as the "razzle-dazzle" type, a term being employed by sport scribes this fall for deceptive and tricky offensive brands of football. A shovel pass, used on several occasions, netted the soldiers huge chunks of yardage and continually caught the Pioneers flat-footed. Twice during the game, M. M. I. touchdown marches were the result of Harrodsburg fumbles, recovered deep in loneer territory by the visitors.

Shining lights in the Harrodsburg defense were Mitchell, substitute center, and Jimmy Best. Best made at least fifty percent of the tackles during the fracas, and in the last half shifted from defensive halfback to end, where he stopped many Cadet runners dead in their tracks. Offensively, Best was the only threat the Pioneers could offer, while Donovan turned in a neat performance.

Coach Goranflo's charges turned this week their attention to regaining some of their lost prestige at the expense of the Lawrenceburg High eleven, whom they meet Friday afternoon at Lawrenceburg. This contest will mark the first game away from home for the locals, and a large number of Pioneer fans plan to journey to the Anderson capitol for the contest.

President Starts Red Cross Drive

President Roosevelt praised the work of the American Red Cross as he accepted membership No. 1 on October 20.

In accepting the membership he said to Admiral Cary T. Grayson, chairman of the Red Cross:

"I am happy to join with you in this little ceremony because it affords me an opportunity—a very welcome opportunity—to enroll again in the annual membership roll call of the American Red Cross. It permits me also to commend 4,000,000 men and women, who, under your direction, have worked so loyally and so efficiently during the past year.

"I have visited those sections of the country where the floods and tornadoes of last spring brought death and distress to many thousands

of families. I saw the work the men and women of the Red Cross did in those areas. I heard everywhere good reports of the fine labors of Red Cross workers.

"It is my hope that every man and woman who is able to do so will enroll as a member of the Red Cross during the roll call: from Armistice Day to Thanksgiving."
