MESSAGE FROM PRISONER SON RELAYED TO PARENTS

A message from their son, Earl Fowler, a prisoner of the Japanese since the fall of Bataan, was included in a short-wave enemy broadcast picked up from Japan. Mr. and Mrs. Clifton Fowler of Burgin were notified recently.

The Federal Communications Commission has issued a warning, however, that the purpose of such broadcasts is to attract listeners in the United States to Japanese propaganda. Forwarded to the parents from Washington, Earl's message said:

"Hope this finds all well. I am okay and in good health. Tell Pearl and Garnett hello. I sure hope this finds them all right. Tell Uncle and Aunt hello for me and that I hope to see them soon. You sure would be surprised to see me now. I have put on several pounds since I saw you last. Please don't worry about me and please write. Some of the fellows from Kentucky have recived 20 letters to date. Love, Earl."
