General sorrow was expressed when the message was received here that Garrett Elbridge Tewmey, 74, had been instantly killed at 6 p.m. August 27, 1936, at Calvert City, Ky., where he had made his home for the past six years with his youngest daughter, Mrs. Voris Burnett and Rev. Burnett. He was crossing the railroad track near his home when he was struck by a fast train, which was 40 minutes late and rushing to make up lost time. He evidently thought the train had passed and being handicapped with deafness did not hear its approach.

His remains were brought to Harrodsburg, his former home, the following day, accompanied by Rev. and Mrs. Voris Burnett and daughter and Miss Mildred Roberts. On Monday night, September 7 (Labor Day) an all-star aggregation of Harrodsburg players will meet a team from Perryville.

SOFTBALL DOPE... A

Winning 15 and losing 7 games during the past season, the Presbyterian team won the Harrodsburg Church League Softball championship as a result of their victory over the Baptists in Tuesday night's game which they won 6 to 4. The Christians defeated the Methodists 3 to 2 in the opening game of Tuesday night's play.

The pennant-winning Presbyterians were followed by the Baptists who won 13 and lost 9 games. The Chris-

tians were in third place with 10 victories against 12 losses, and the Methodists were in the league cellar with 6 wins over 16 defeats.

Dunn and Gatchell were batters for the Presbyterians, who made a total of 7 hits, 6 runs and 1 error. Royalty and Bottoms were batters for the Baptists who made 8 hits, 4 runs and 1 error.

In the opening game Pierce and Murphy were batters for the Christians who made 7 hits, 3 runs and 3 errors, while Hatchett and Chanceller were batters for the Methodists, scoring 5 hits, 2 runs and 2 errors.

In last Friday night's game the Baptists defeated the Methodists 10 to 1, and the Presbyterians defeated the Christians 8 to 2.

Added excitement was occasioned Tuesday night when a section of the bleachers collapsed due to supports sinking, precipitating several hundred spectators to the ground. However, excepting minor abrasions to several persons, no one was seriously injured.

A team selected from the victorious Presbyterian and Christian teams will meet a team selected from members of the Baptist and Methodist tens in a game Friday night. The admission will not be charged and proceeds from this game will go toward defraying costs of a dinner to be given the members of the four church league teams.

The evening of Labor Day (Monday September 7) will be featured by a game between the Perryville team and an All-star aggregation, picked from the Harrodsburg teams.
