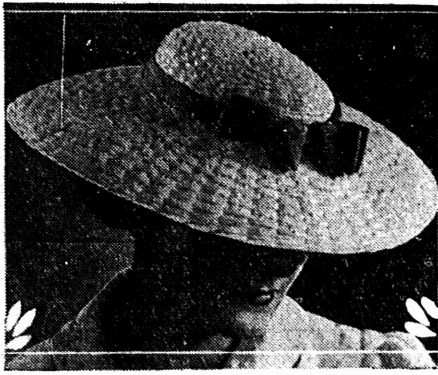


LUSTER IS MARK OF SMARTNESS IN HATS

The diamond mesh veil gives a smart touch to the model which is intended for street wear with summer sheers and for after five o'clock occasions. The other hat shows the trend toward weaving and rough effects in midsummer wear. The medium brim low crown sailor is woven of laminated ribbon made of the cellulose film and has a simple grosgrain ribbon band and front bow of contrasting color. It is light weight and cool, becoming to both short and tall, and appropriate for tailored frocks as well as for dressy afternoon wear—a very useful hat.

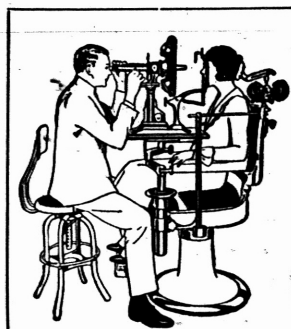
