The Harrodsburg City Schools will open Monday morning, September 7, at 9 o'clock.

All parents who have children in the first-six grades are requested to come to the Graded School on Monday morning with the children to sign the card for Free Text-Books. No book may be issued to any child until his parent or guardian has signed this card.

All Junior and Senior High school students will convene in the auditorium of the high school to receive their instructions for enrollment and classification.

All pupils entering our school from another school will be expected to bring a report card showing the school work done during the last school year. All high school students entering from another high school are required to have a transcript of their credits sent to the school by the principal of the last high school they attended.

Preliminary conferences of the teachers will be held on Friday, September 4. The elementary teachers will meet at the Graded School at 9 o'clock in the morning and the Junior and Senior high school teachers will meet at the High School in the afternoon at 2 o'clock.
