NORVELL

ARMSTRONG

Funeral services for Robert O. Armstrong, 72, who died Saturday afternoon, Jan. 11, 1936, at his home at Thorn Hill, Frankfort, were held at the residence Monday with the Rev. Olof Anderson and the Rev. W. S. Shearer officiating. Burial was in Frankfort Cemetery.

Mr. Armstrong was born and reared in Mercer county, a descendant of notable pioneer families. He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Jane Leavelle Armstrong; three sons, William L., John L. and Robert O. Armstrong; a daughter, Mrs. Gus Smith, Franklin county; a sister, Mrs. William Palmer, Whiteland, Ind., and two brothers, John Armstrong, Harrodsburg, and Charles Armstrong, Crab Orchard.

TOMLINSON

Funeral services for William Tomlinson, 70 years old, were held at 10:30 Thursday morning, January 9, 1936, at the grave in the family lot in Spring Hill cemetery. Dr. John W. Carpenter, pastor of the Harrodsburg Presbyterian church, conducted the last rites.

Mr. Tomlinson died at 3:30 a. m. January 6 at Mercy Hospital, Monroe, Mich., from a paralytic stroke which he suffered December 31, 1935. The son of Dr. and Mrs. William M. Tomlinson, formerly of Harrodsburg, he received his education at Danville Academy, graduated from Chicago Medical College in 1877, and served his internship at Philadelphia before beginning practice with his father in Harrodsburg. He was descended from prominent early settlers in this community.

He is survived by his daughter, Mrs. R. B. Stolp, of Wilmette, Ill., who accompanied the body to Harrodsburg, and two grandchildren.

WHITMER

Mrs. T. L. Whitmer, 84, died Tuesday January 14, 1936, at her home in Evansville, Ind., of infirmities incident to her advanced years. She is survived by two daughters, Mrs. Emma Clark, Owensboro, Mrs. Greg Jennings, Evansville; two sons, James W. Whitmer, Evansville, T. LeRoy Whitmer, of Harrodsburg, Ky.; one sister, Mrs. J. H. Gardner, of Des Moines, Iowa, and one brother, Joe McIntyre, of Estelline, Texas. Mrs. J. R. Whitmer, Owensboro, is a daughter-in-law of the deceased. She is survived by the following grandchildren: Mrs. Walter C. Kirk, Marvin and James T. Whitmer, Owensboro; Lyman Clark, Evansville, Lurena and Thomas Jennings, of Evansville, and three great-grandchildren, Betty and Joyce Jennings, Evansville, and Joseph Walter Kirk, of Owensboro.

Mrs. Whitmer was the widow of the late Thomas L. Whitmer, and resided at South Carrollton, Ky., Muhlenberg county, until eighteen years ago, when she moved to Evansville. Mr. Whitmer died in 1923.

The funeral was conducted at 10 o'clock Friday morning, with burial in the Memorial Park cemetery, Evansville. Mr. and Mrs. T. L. Whitmer, of Harrodsburg, attended the funeral.

DEVER

Mrs. L. G. Lantz, of this city, was called last Wednesday evening to the home of her brother, Walter Brown Dever, of Rowlesburg, West Virginia, who sustained fatal injuries Wednesday morning at 9:30 when he was freed from the locomotive he was operating near Newburg. Immediately after the accident he was taken to the Grafton City Hospital, and though reports at the time were that he was not seriously hurt, he died Thursday morning at 11:30 o'clock.

He was born January 14, 1880 at Mill Gap, Highland county, Virginia, the son of Jasper N. and Julia E. Kincaid Dever. Graduating from Staaten College, Virginia, he later became employed by the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad Company, serving that company as an engineer for thirty-four years. Thirty years ago he went to live in Rowlesburg and ten years afterward was united in marriage with Miss Dola Fraley who survives him. He is also survived by one brother, William W. Deyer, Monterey, Virginia; and two sisters, Mrs. Josephine Sively, Mountain Grove, Virginia, and Mrs. L. G. Lantz of this city.

He was a member of the Rowlesburg Methodist Episcopal Church, of the Knights Templar, the I. O. O. F., and the Brotherhood of Railroad Engineers, and was President of the Board of Education of Preston County, West Virginia.

Funeral services were held in the Methodist Episcopal Church of Rowlesburg, the Rev. Arthur Lansby officiating; interment was at Terre Alta, West Virginia.

EDWARDS

Chase G. Edwards, 50 years old, died suddenly Monday at his farm near Perryville. He was to have met his wife at 11 o'clock, but when he did not arrive Mrs. Edwards concluded some business had kept him at the farm, but when 3 o'clock came and he had not appeared, a search was made and his body was found a half hour later by John Bugg and Hobart Gibson. He had apparently dropped from a heart attack while crossing a field.

Mr. Edwards, a prominent citizen of Perryville, was manager of the telephone office there, having succeeded to the position about 1926 af-

ter the death of his father, Bruce Edwards. His health had been declining for the past year. He is survived by his wife who was Miss DeBaun before her marriage; his mother, Mrs. Addie Edwards, Perryville, and one sister, Mrs. DeWitt Adams, of Harrodsburg.

The funeral was held at 3 o'clock Tuesday at the residence with the Rev. E. L. Omer conducting the service, in the absence of his pastor, the minister of the Presbyterian church. The Baptist and Methodist ministers assisted in the service. Burial was in Hillcrest cemetery, Perryville.

OVERSTREET

Nancy Ann Overstreet, baby daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Raymond Overstreet, of Salvisa, closed a brief life of nine days on January 3, 1936. She was born December 24, 1935. After a short prayer service the baby was buried in Providence cemetery. She was the first child of Raymond and Dora May Adams Overstreet, who survive.

ROBINSON

Burial rites for Mrs. Mamie Park, Mrs. Robinson, widow of the late Chas. Wickliffe Robinson, formerly of Harrodsburg, will be at the family lot in Spring Hill cemetery this afternoon at 2:30 o'clock. Mrs. Robinson died Wednesday, January 15, 1936, about 6 o'clock at her home in Pee-wee Valley at which place she had been residing for a number of years. Death came to her after a long illness. She is survived by two daughters, Mrs. Leslie Brown, of Detroit, Mich., and Mrs. Albert Kramer, of Washington, D. C., who is secretary of the Kentucky Club in that city; a son also survives, Mr. Ashby Robinson, of Pee-wee Valley, another son, Wickliffe Robinson, having died some years ago. A sister, Mrs. Grant Cook, of Danville, and brother and sister in New York, also survive.

Mrs. Robinson and her family were prominently identified with the life in Harrodsburg during her residence here, and retained many warm friends in this city. Her sister-in-law, Mrs. John W. Hughes, went to Pee-wee Valley Wednesday evening. The funeral service will be held in that place, with the burial following here.

LITTRREL

Mrs. Lizzie Littrel, one of the highly esteemed women of Burgin, died at her home in that city Sunday afternoon about 4 o'clock and her funeral was conducted at 10 o'clock Tuesday at the Baptist church in Burgin with burial in Shawnee Run cemetery. Her pastor, Rev. J. O. Carter, was in charge of the rites. Mrs. Littrel was a member of a prominent pioneer family of that section of Mercer county. She was the daughter of Rev. and Mrs. Strother Cook and was born August 15, 1859, and at the time of her death January 6, 1936 she was a little over 76 years of age. In April, 1890 she was married to W. J. Littrel, who died in January 1897. She was one of twelve children all of whom have passed on with their parents, except two sisters and a brother, Mrs. J. B. Stone, Norwood, O.; Mrs. Emma Rose, of Piqua, O., and James S. Cook, of Vicksburg, Miss. Early in life she united with the Shawnee Run Baptist church, and on going to Burgin to reside she placed her membership with the church there, and during her life was interested and faithful in its activities.

L. C. Dunn, prominent dairyman and farmer, died at 11:30 Tuesday night, January 14, 1936, at his home on the Harrodsburg-Danville road, at Cove Springs.

He was born in Lincoln county, the son of Arelius and Belle VanArsdale Dunn.

Mr. Dunn is survived by his wife, Mrs. Lillian Worthington Dunn; three children, Mary Lee Dunn, Virginia Belle Dunn and Lewis Crews Dunn; one sister, Mrs. J. J. Dismuke, Burgin and two brothers, C. H. and W. V. Dunn, Hustonville.

The funeral will be at 10:30 o'clock this morning with services at the grave in Danville by the pastor of the Methodist church of that city.

THOMAS

Henry J. Thomas died about 9 o'clock Wednesday night, January 15, 1936 at his home on Tabler avenue after a short illness. He was born April 16, 1880, in Ohio and was prominent in the carriage business in Cincinnati when he left the Continental Carriage Company to come to Harrodsburg 22 years ago to become associated with the late George and Davis Bohon in the buggy factory here. He has remained with the firm as a valued and efficient employee in various capacities under the late Hanly Bohon and the present president, Davis Bohon, Jr. He expressed a wish that his funeral procession be driven by the Bohon plant as it left Harrodsburg, and this will be complied with.

The funeral will be at 1 o'clock today at the residence, 309 Tabler avenue, in Highland Addition, Rev. G. R. Tomlin, of the Methodist church will officiate, assisted by Dr. John W. Carpenter, Presbyterian, and Rev. T. Hassell Bowen, Christian church.

The cortège will then leave for Cincinnati. A second funeral service will be conducted at 2:30 Monday afternoon at Brand Brothers Funeral Home in Cincinnati. Burial will be in Vine Street Cemetery. Surviving are his wife, Mrs. Katherine Thomas, a step-daughter, Mrs. Katherine Wagner, and two stepsons, Frank and Elmer Bauer, all of Cincinnati; also three sisters, Mrs. Carrie Hamond, Mrs. Rosa Rub, Cincinnati, and Mrs. Ida Hutzler, of Colonie, N. Y. He also leaves six nephews and two nieces.
