

Hoboes Plan National Home Near Bardstown

Locate Union's Home Near Where Collins Wrote Ky. Song "Because He Was a Hobo."

The hoboes of America were in mourning last week over the loss of one of their executive board members, who Jeff Davis, their "King" said, signed hobo correspondence as the "Columbus Kid, sometimes known as Thurston, the magician." Thurston, a native of Columbus, Ohio, had been a trustee or "engineer" in the hobos' order since 1917, Davis declared.

Moreover the "boes plan 'something more permanent' than mere signs of mourning. Davis, dynamic little leader of an asserted membership of 811,000 in the International Itinerant Workers' Union, announced. They plan to erect a "Thurston cottage" on a "National Home" farm they propose to buy near Bardstown, Ky.

Already, he said, \$184 is available toward the purchase price and there's "promise of about \$1,000 more." The farm, he explained, will be a "spot" where "men, who having lost an arm or a leg on the road, and not being citizens of any State, may go to live their last years in peace."

The Bardstown site is being considered, "King Jeff" asserted, because it was near that little community where Stephen Collins Foster "wrote some of his greatest songs."

"And Foster was a hobo" he beamed. "Many a time he didn't know where his next meal was coming from, but he kept right on, a worthy hobo giving of his best, for his songs are among the best, even today."

"Suitable action" toward purchase of the farm, inauguration of the Thurston Memorial and selection of successors to other offices made vacant by death will be among business before the hoboes at their international convention in Louisville May 2-7, Davis announced.

KY. HEIRS GET \$2,040 IN SUITCASE THEY SOLD

Heirs of C. C. Williams, the Court of Appeals held this week, are entitled to the return of \$2,040 found, nine years after his death, hidden in the lining of a suitcase he owned.

Williams, a World War veteran, died in the Atwood Hospital in 1926.

Without knowing about the money, his heirs sold the suitcase to Virgil Baugh, of Eubank, who early last year found the money in \$20 and \$50 certificates, pasted inside the lining with adhesive tape.




