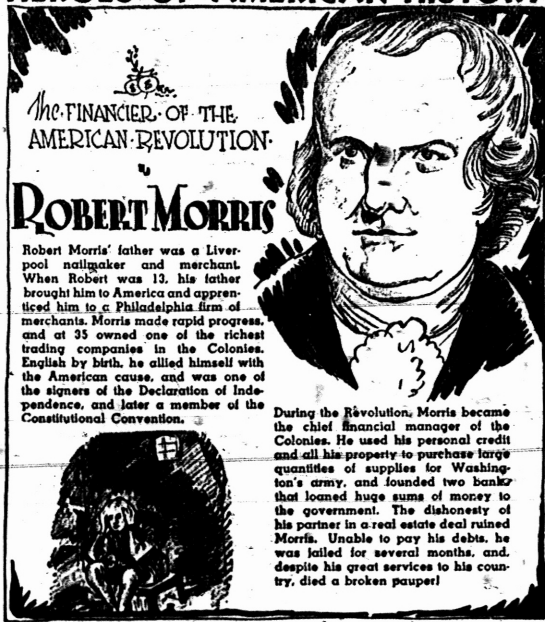

HEROES OF AMERICAN HISTORY



the FINANCIER OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

ROBERT MORRIS

Robert Morris' father was a Liverpool nailmaker and merchant. When Robert was 13, his father brought him to America and apprenticed him to a Philadelphia firm of merchants. Morris made rapid progress, and at 21 owned one of the richest trading companies in the Colonies. English by birth, he called himself with the American cause, and was one of the signers of the Declaration of Independence, and later a member of the Constitutional Convention.

During the Revolution, Morris became the chief financial manager of the Colonies. He used his personal credit and all his property to purchase large quantities of supplies for Washington's army, and founded two banks that loaned huge sums of money to the government. The dishonesty of his partner in a real estate deal ruined Morris. Unable to pay his debts, he was jailed for several months, and, despite his great services to his country, died a broken pauper!
