

32 DEGREES COLDEST APRIL 22 ON RECORD

The lowest record for Apr. 22 since the Weather Bureau was set up in Louisville in 1871, was registered Wednesday when the mercury dropped to 32 degrees at 6 a.m. Officials of the bureau said the previous low mark was 33 degrees in 1876. The all-time low record for the month was established on April 17 and 18, 1875, when a temperature of 21 degrees was recorded. The lowest temperature for the latter part of the month was set April 25, 1919, with 29 degrees.


