Dr. Frank Jewell Nooe, 60 years old, died at his home on North Main street, Harrodsburg, early Tuesday morning, March 24, 1936, after a brief illness of pneumonia.

Dr. Nooe and his family moved to Harrodsburg five years ago where he has been practicing medicine. Before coming to Harrodsburg Dr. Nooe practiced at Cornishville for 22 years. He was a native of Jessamine county, the son of Mrs. Theophilus Nooe, now of Nashville, Tenn., and the late Mr. Nooe. He was a splendid gentleman, a high type Mason, a member of the Mercer county Medical Society and the Christian church.

Survivors are his wife, Mrs. Love Mitchell Nooe; two sons, Ansel and Roger Mitchell Nooe, and a daughter, Miss Irene Nooe, all of Harrodsburg; his mother, two sisters, Mrs. B. M. Allin, Harrodsburg; and Mrs. Robert Thompson, Wilmore; a brother, Dr. Roger T. Nooe, pastor of the Vine Street Christian church, Nashville, Tenn., and one grandchild.

Funeral services were held Thursday afternoon at 2 o'clock at the Harrodsburg Christian church, conducted by the Rev. T. Hassell Bowen, pastor, assisted by the Rev. John W. 
