

catalogues, as were printed for the defendant in this case, and were you so acquainted with such prices during the years 1918 and 1919?

A. 21. I am.

Q. 22. You may state whether or not the charges made against Mr. Chelf on account of printing and binding the catalogues, and making catalogue envelopes, and furnishing the cuts, was, or was not, the reasonable market value of such charges for such work in furnishing such material at that time.

A. 22. They were.

Q. 23. You may state whether or not the Combe Printing Company furnished all material for doing this work?

A. 23. They furnished all of the material for the catalogues and the catalogue envelopes, and they furnished cuts for which we charged \$13.58. These were special cuts ordered by him, but Mr. Chelf furnished other cuts, which were returned to him with the new cuts, for which he was charged.

Q. 24. You have stated when these goods were billed to Mr. Chelf? I will now ask you to state when they were actually shipped to him.

A. 24. 2000 were shipped to Mr. Chelf February 13, 1919, by the American Railroad Express Company. We have their receipt in their printed book, signed by their agent. The next day, being the 14th of February, 1919, we shipped the remainder of the order and the cuts, and the cuts which Mr. Chelf had given us, by freight, delivering the same to the C. B. & Q. Railroad Company, at St. Joseph, Missouri, and I hand the Notary Public the original bill of lading. We introduce in evidence the bill of lading and ask that the same be identified as Exhibit "B", which is here done, and the same attached to deposition.

Q. 25. Mr. Boyce, I will ask you whether or not there are any other credits, counterclaims, or offsets to this account?

A. 25. None whatever, except the credits for which he has already received credit.

Q. 26. What is the balance due the Combe Printing Company, if any, from the defendant?
