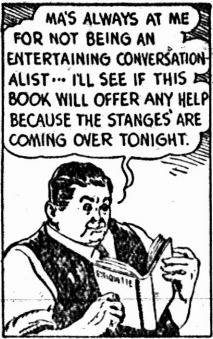

SAP DOES NOT RISE IN SPRING, GO DOWN IN FALL

It is a common notion that the sap of a tree rises in the spring and goes down in the fall. But it has been found that such is not the case. In the fall the center of a tree is very wet and the outer part is comparatively dry, while in the spring just the opposite is true—the center is dry and the outer part is comparatively dry. This has led to the erroneous idea, now prevalent, that the sap in a tree rises in the spring and goes down in the fall. The correct expression, if we wish to make our meaning clear about the matter is that the sap (circulation of the liquid in a tree) is out, that is, near the bark in the spring and in, that is, near the center, in the fall.

WORLD'S BIGGEST X-RAY MACHINE IN KENTUCKY

Ground was broken at Covington Saturday for the erection of a temporary structure to house the world's largest X-ray machine, says an INS dispatch from that city. When completed X-ray equipment worth \$75,000 and capable of taking up to 1,200,000 volts of electricity will be installed in the building. The electrical capacity of the machine is 500,000 Volts more than any other similar apparatus ever set up. The X-ray, which will be used in the treatment of cancer, was built by the Kelly Koett Manufacturing Co.

Clarence Brown, of Iowa City, Ia., is the white man who sacrificed his eye-sight that the Indians may be kept from going blind. With one eye already sightless the 50-year-old Iowan, incurably ill from another disease, entered an Indian hospital in Arizona and allowed physicians to implant the virus of trachoma in his good eye. In six weeks he was totally blind, proving the disease is communicable. His contribution to science will doubtless be of value in checking trachoma, great scourge among Indians.

Political Leaders Not Dumb

During the presidency of James K. Polk, one of the famous private schools of Boston was presided over by a salty old gentleman whose speeches to the boys were long remembered.

Looking down from the platform one morning, he said: "Young gentlemen, as I gaze into your alert and intelligent faces I am thrilled at the thought of your latent possibilities. Who can say what contribution to the history of your country may be in the making in this room today? One of you may be an Adams. One of you may be a Jefferson. And Heaven knows any one of you can be a Polk without half trying!"

It is a well established American custom to belittle the holders of public office, from the President down. No politician is great until after he is dead, and then, given time enough, he becomes a statesman.

Washington's letters to his wife and friends were full of bitter complaint against the buffeting and sneers levelled against him. Lincoln was looked on as a pathetic mistake by a large part of the intelligentsia of the nation. I have seen a collection of sermons which were preached in the churches of Boston which "speak of him as a man who, in spite of lack of education and culture, tried hard to do his best." Not one preacher suggested that he was great. Woodrow Wilson was the impractical school-master; Calvin Coolidge was "an accident."

Taken as a whole, our presidents have been a fine lot. If they have not been "great" men the question is, who in any generation was greater or would have done the job better? While I exercise the citizen's right to criticize the President and Congress, I sometimes grow a little weary of the complacent assumption of superiority on the part of our so-called "best" citizens. Business is business, and politics

is a different business. When a man gets to the top in politics it may not mean that he is a genius, but certainly, he is not dumb.

Move Forward on Courage

I used to attend the annual sales convention of a company which is so big that most people think it has no problems at all. The man in the streets fondly imagines that all its officials have to do is to send out the bills and deposit the checks. The funny thing about the sales meetings was that one district manager after another would stand up and tell how the company's leading competitor was stealing all the big orders.

Later I had occasion to endure a similar meeting held by this principal competitor, and there the story was exactly the same. Each of these two big companies was absolutely sure that the other was getting the best of the battle.

The other day the president of a railroad emitted a loud moan. He said that of all industries the railroads have the toughest "problem." They have to pay high taxes and maintain expensive road beds while the busses run gaily along the concrete highways built with taxpayers' money.

I had hardly dried my eyes before I encountered the sales manager of a bus company. Was he happy? He was not. According to him, the railroads have enough influence with state legislatures to get laws passed at almost every session making it harder for the trucks and busses.

What is true of these companies is even more true, of course, of individuals. Each one sees his own troubles—large and clear, and only the successes of the other fellow. General Grant was asked whether he was ever scared and if so how he had managed to win his battles. He replied that he always assumed that the enemy probably was just as frightened as he was, maybe more. With that he tightened up his belt and went forward.

THE 1936 TOBACCO CROP

(Shelby News)

Shelby County farmers are wondering just what size tobacco crop to plant in 1936. Before they make up their minds, perhaps it would be wise to review the past two years. Most farmers that signed reduction contracts have learned a new method of growing tobacco. They have planted it closer on the ground, topped it higher, and as a result have found that they secured a higher quality of smoker tobacco. Most farmers will continue close planting and high topping since they expect to sell as much high grade tobacco as possible. If this practice is continued in 1936 on an acreage larger than they grew in 1935 considerable difficulty may be encountered in housing the crop.

Contract signers found that 60 per cent of their former acreage occupied considerable more space in the barn than tobacco that was grown under the old methods of culture. Perhaps the average tobacco grower will increase his 1936 acreage. This is expected to mean a lower price for the 1936 crop. It seems wise then for individual farmers to undertake to grow a high quality tobacco. They can do this with small acreages much better than with large acreage. A large acreage of tobacco crowded into a barn is most difficult to cure.

SALES OF AUTOMOBILE RADIOS PASS MILLION MARK IN 1935

Automobile radios have passed the million mark in sales for the first time and will probably reach a total of 1,100,000 for the year, according to an estimate in the December issue of Radio Retailing. This compares with a total of 780,000 sets sold during last year.

The total retail value of auto radio sets sold this year will exceed \$53,000,000, the estimate says, while the total retail billings for auto radios in 1934, including tubes, was \$32,500,000, indicating a gain of 64 per cent in retail billings this year.

The total number of radio equipped automobiles in the United States is placed at 2,300,000 by the authority, while the average price per set is placed at \$48.50, each set averaging 5.8 tubes. These figures include many radio installations in trucks and busses as well as in private automobiles.

NAZIS REWRITE BIBLE; HOLD CHRIST NOT JEW

Ardent Nazi pastors are rewriting Luther's version of the Bible to harmonize it with their anti-Jewish feelings and professed belief that Christ, after all, "was not Jewish."

Bishop Weidemann of Bremen, Germany, disclosed to a recent meeting of the Evangelical Churches there that the new Bible, long clamored for by some Nazis, is under preparation.

Hans Kerl, Nazi director of church affairs, is understood to have declined to associate his ministry with the meeting.

"The new translators are not concerned with the Luther of yesterday but the Christ of today," said Bishop Weidemann, asserting that "a German shuts a book immediately that tells him his law was given him by Moses."
