LINCOLN CO. PWA OFFICIAL  
FOUND DEAD IN HIS AUTO

William T. Stone, 69, Stanford contractor and Lincoln County PWA supervisor, was found dead at the wheel of his automobile about 10:30 a.m. Monday.

Mr. Stone, who left home that morning seemingly in good health, to investigate work on a PWA project near Hustonville, was seen to stop his car near the offices of Dr. L. J. Jones and Dr. E. E. Weddle. After a time, passersby summoned the doctors, who pronounced him dead of a heart attack.

NO FEES REQUIRED FOR  
PENSION APPLICATION

Applicants for pensions under Kentucky's old-age pension law are warned by Walter W. Mulbry, secretary to Gov. A. B. Chandler, that it is not necessary "to pay anyone a fee for application blanks or for any other service relative to the pension."

Mulbry's warning was in the form of letters sent to a number of aged Kentuckians who have written the Governor's office relative to the pension, payment of which will start next July 1.

Mulbry said Governor Chandler had been advised that in some parts of the State lawyers are charging aged persons from \$1 to \$4 as a fee for handling pension applications.

DANVILLE PICTURE SHOW  
TO HAVE NEW HOME

Construction of a new theatre for the city of Danville will be started about the middle of March, according to an announcement by officials of the Warner Brothers' Company.

Officials of the company, which operate the Kentucky Theatre in that city, stated that the new theatre would be located in the old Frank Building at the corner of Main and Second Streets.

The new show house, with a seating capacity of 450 persons, will be opened sometime during the month of April and will be one of the most outstanding small theatre houses in this section.

'FINIS' FOR INTERURBAN  
OUT OF NICHOLASVILLE

A score or more of workmen began this week dismantling the old interurban tracks between Nicholasville and Lexington. In the early days of its existence the company did a big business and also real estate along the line went up in prices as suburban homes began to be built along its line, and there were predictions that in time the two cities would merge. Automobile and bus service rendered the interurban obsolete.

It was estimated that the cost of the twelve miles when constructed was about \$1600 a mile.

## Where Oil, Gas Are Found

Many persons have the impression that oil and gas are found in great caverns under vast domes, in open spaces, hundreds or thousands of feet down. That is not the case. Both oil and gas are within rock, sandstone, limestone, or conglomerate that is highly porous. It is under terrific pressure, having been sealed in by some layer of impervious rock just above it, annealed as it were. When a well taps that impervious roof, and reaches down into the sandstone, pressure is released at that point and the gas or oil filters through the rock toward a possible release. In time it comes flowing up. Whole areas in time go dry.

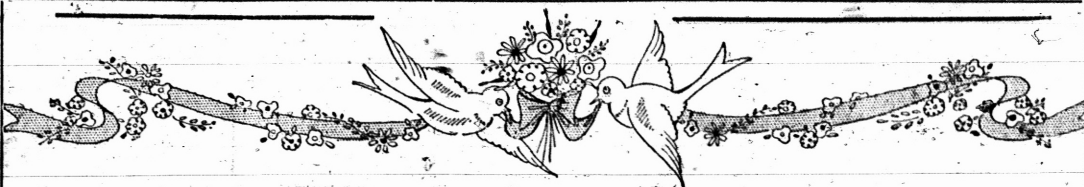
## First Bathing "Health Menace"

America's first bathtub was built in Cincinnati in 1842. It was of mahogany, lined with sheet-lead, and was exhibited at a party. Next day, local papers denounced it as "luxurious and democratic vanity." Medical men took it up and pronounced the bathtub a "menace to health." In 1843, Philadelphia undertook by public ordinance to prohibit bathing between November 1 and March 15. Two years later Boston made bathing unlawful except when prescribed by physicians. Bathtubs were taxed \$30 yearly. And that was only a little more than 90 years ago.
