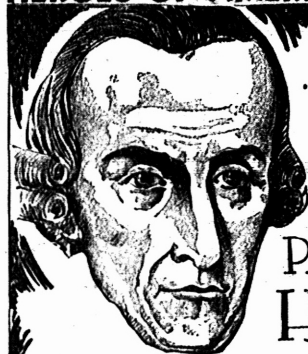

HENRY

Patrick Henry was a very fiery young man. He preferred hunting and fishing to school, and often sneaked away to the woods when he was supposed to be in class. However, he had the marvelous gift of oratory and became a famous lawyer. In court he once made a mistake and argued in masterly fashion on behalf of his opponent. Told of his error, Henry bravely answered his own arguments, and won the case!



Patrick Henry was the father of seventeen children. He was very popular and was later governor of Virginia for many terms. In 1775, with the revolution at a critical stage, he made his famous speech against the tyranny of England, ending with the immortal words: "I know not what course others may take, but as for me, give me liberty or give me death!"

## CHAMPION MARE IS SOLD HERE

Myra Hill, Winner Of \$250 Walk-Trot Stake At Horse Show Is Purchased By Dixiana Farms.

Myra Hill, an attractive walk-trot mare ridden by Thomas Murphy, marched to triumph in winning the \$250 championship three-gaited stake at the Harrodsburg Horse Show Friday night, over the mare The Twinn which finished second and My Lady Best which took third. Although Myra Hill is only a 3-year-old she defeated a ring of aged horses in a hard-fought battle. She was purchased Wednesday in Harrodsburg by Dixiana Farm, Lexington. She is a 15-hand chestnut filly with wonderful action and bears a stylish way of going. The filly was purchased from J. W. Murphy, Stanford, after winning five straight walk-trot classes, and the victory Friday night was her sixth.

My Lady Best and The Twinn are from the show stable of Charles Williams, Cincinnati. The Twinn is by the stallion The Yankee and made a good show of competition for the Dixiana mare as did her stablemate a chestnut mare My Lady Best by Peavine's Highland Chief. The Twinn was purchased several years ago from Winganek farm where she was bred.

Mrs. Hurley B. Gould's beautiful black gelding Master of Ceremonies made a striking bow to win the \$250 championship fine harness stake from the Lexington gelding Taystee, a chestnut owned and shown by Robert E. Moreland, Virginia Waterson, owned and shown by Mrs. Garnett Smith, of Louisville, finished third while Miss Alene Virgin's chestnut filly Sweetheart Forever was fourth.

Mrs. Gould's gelding showed in top form and would have been hard to beat Friday night by the champion harness horses at the larger shows.

Robert E. Moreland, of Lexington, showing the "suckling filly" Choice Quality by Kingston's Choice was the decision of first in the championship colt stake for \$250. This filly was a standout over a large field of contestants. Second to Choice Quality was Fairy Prince, a chestnut colt by Kalamara Rex and out of Sarah Reed, thus being a full brother to the champion filly Fairy Slippers, that won the yearling division of the year prior.

Third to the filly Choice Quality was placed another from Ray Thurman's Kalamara Farm, Kalamara Rebel a chestnut suckling colt by Kalamara Rex and out of the mare Margery Kelley, thus a full brother to Gold Block, the top colt of 1933 at the Kentucky, Indiana and Ohio state fairs.

Worthy Forbes, by the trotting stallion J. Malcolm Forbes, was awarded first in the championship roadster stake for mares, stallions, or geldings Friday afternoon. He is owned
