Mrs. Louie Cardwell Stone, 67 years old, died of a heart attack at her home in Washington, D. C. Friday afternoon, July 31, 1936, and news of her sudden passing was a shock and grief to many friends here, although it was known that she had not been well for several months. She was a resident of Harrodsburg until a few years ago she went to Washington to be near her daughter, Mrs. Waldo Clark, but she kept in touch with this city by frequent visits home.

The daughter of the late Joe and Sarah Meyers Ellis, Mrs. Stone was popular for her many fine qualities of character. Her remains arrived in Harrodsburg Sunday morning and the funeral was at 3 o'clock that afternoon at the Christian church, where she had been an active member for many years. Burial was in Spring Hill cemetery. The services were conducted by Rev. Horace Kingsbury, of Lancaster, a former pastor, in the absence from the city of the regular pastor, Rev. T. Hassell Bowen. A law to this effect has been promulgated that all workers, regardless of occupation are entitled to annual vacations with pay of at least 15 consecutive days, including at least 12 working days after one year's continuous employment.
