## Daytonian Freed From Japs Expects To Be Home Soon

Sgt. Charles Quinn will be in Dayton in a few days. But when he was a prisoner in the Japanese camp of Cabanatuan in the Philippines, Dayton seemed very remote.

The soldier landed in San Francisco Thursday with 274 other American heroes of Bataan. He called his family yesterday afternoon to tell his mother, Mrs. Carrie Quinn of 311 Morton avenue, that he would be home soon.

Their conversation was not about the soldier's heroic exploits. Sergeant Quinn had received no word from his family during three years' internment and wanted to catch up with home things.

During the 20-minute telephone conversation, he told his mother

he wanted most to see the folks at home. Then he wants something good to eat. "He sounded so natural and clear," his sister-in-law, Mrs. Melvin Quinn of 705 Osmond avenue, declared.

Three other families are waiting to see him, also. They are his brothers, Walter of 1616 Gummer avenue, and Cecil of Kentucky, and his sister in Cincinnati.
